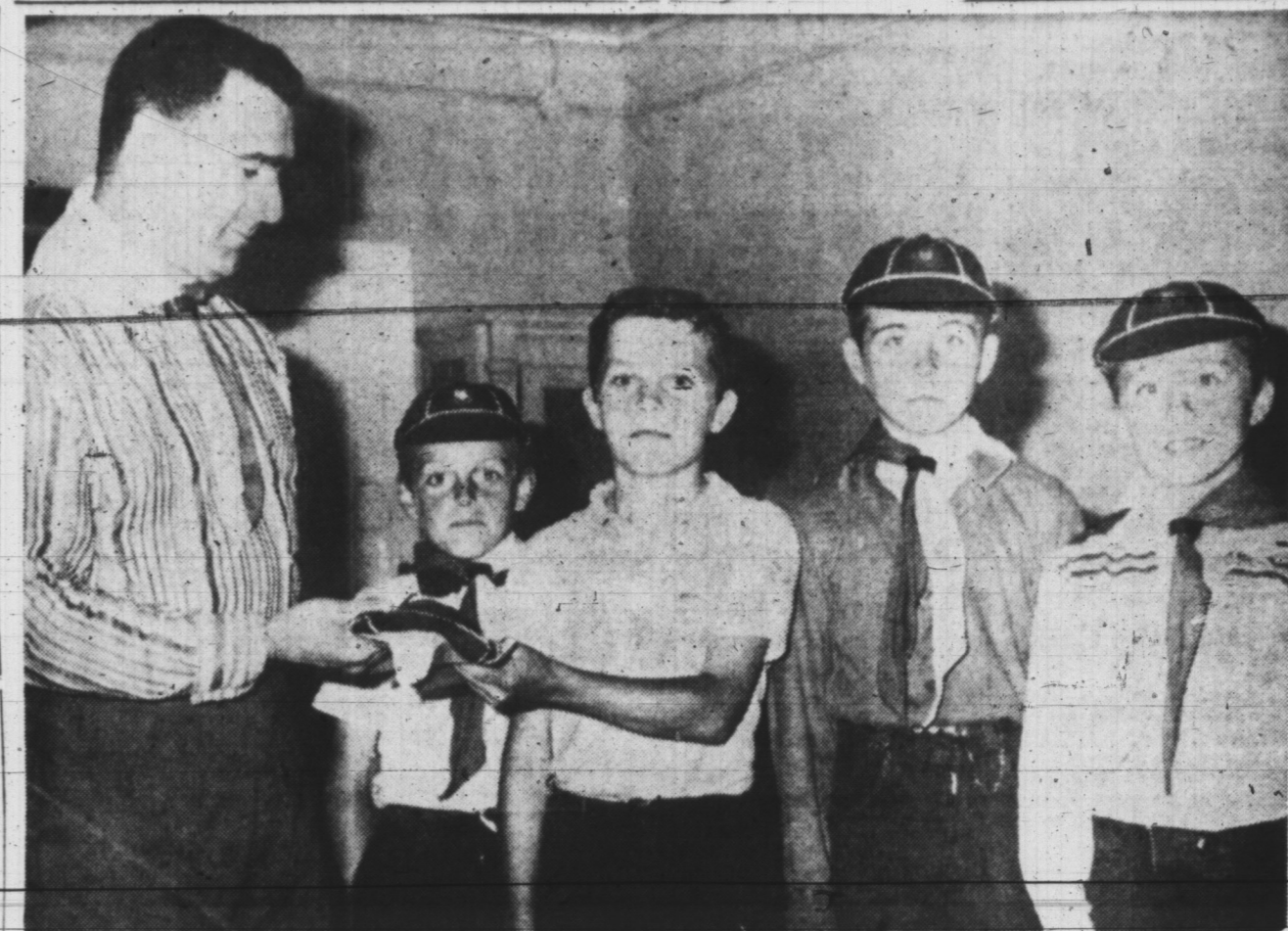

Real Enemy Seen By Ky

WASHINGTON (AP) — South Vietnamese Premier Nguyen Cao Ky says the Chinese Communists are the "real enemy, real danger" in Southeast Asia and he believes "it's better to face them right now than in five or 10 years."

In a copyrighted interview in the current issue of U.S. world and news report, Ky repeated his contention that "only a military invasion of North Viet Nam can bring victory in the Southeast Asian war."

He said: "As long as the North . . . is

safe, and they will be able to continue to send troops down here (to South Viet Nam)—as long as they continue infiltration, subversion, it means we'll continue to have ambushes, assassinations. There will be no real peace."

When asked whether an invasion of the North would bring China into the war, Ky told the magazine: "The real enemy, the real danger for the future, in Southeast Asia is the Chinese Communists. And with their policy of aggression, expansion, domination, I think, sooner or later, we as free men have to face the Chinese Communists. And I think it's better to face them right now than in five or 10 years."
