Semi-Final Bout Steals Show

Mario Nini, the New Brunswick lumberjack, last evening was obviously no match for the sharp boxing prowess of Don 'Duck' Trainor, the fighting policeman. Trainor was awarded a tko in the seventh round.

In the curtain raiser Carl Agape' Arsenault won over Kenny Dean of Halifax by a unanimous decision.

The semi-final bout, an eight rounder, stole the whole show. This match was between Bruno Boucher, the fighting Frenchman from Chicoutimi, Quebec and 'Peanuts' Arsenault of Summerside.

Judges for this fight card were Allison Gillis and Danny MacCormac.

Referees were: Hickey Nicholson for the curtain raiser and semi-final, and Wilf McCluskey for the other preliminary and the main scrap.

Nick Weatherston and Nicholson put Dal back in the lead with touchdowns and Sedgwick kicked the converts. Sedgwick picked up the last tally of the game with a field goal.

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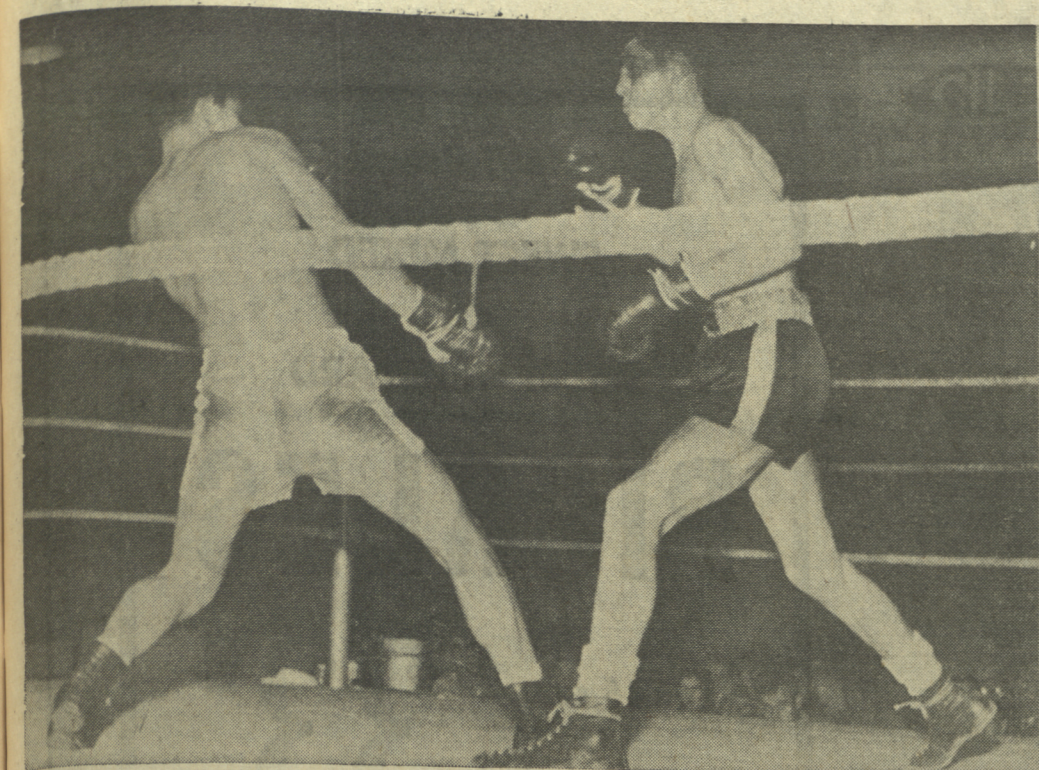
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READY TO FIRE

Reject Appeal To Reinstate Goalie

CHICAGO (AP) — The University of North Dakota's appeal for reinstatement of hockey goalie Bob Peters Wednesday was rejected by the policy-making council of the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

McGill Athletes Are Out In Front

LONDON, Ont. (CP)—Athletes from McGill University took top honors in the Senior intercollegiate track and field meet held here Wednesday.

McGill led the meet with 52½ points, edging Western with 47. In third place was Varsity with 37½ points, followed by McMaster with 31 and Queen's eight.

Outstanding performer in the meet was John Passmore of McMaster. Passmore won three events, the senior 120-yard high hurdles; the senior 440-yard dash and the senior 220-yard hurdles.

He was also anchor man on the McMaster senior mile relay team which finished behind Western in that event. All this earned him the Hee Phillips Memorial Trophy.

LOTS OF COMPETITION However, Passmore had plenty of competition for the award. John Whalen of McGill, a medical student from Piedmont, California, established a new intercollegiate mark for the pole vault when he cleared the bar at 12 feet, 9½ inches.

There were other notable records in smashing feats, too. Ken Money, from Varsity leaped six feet, five inches in the senior high jump. Money, fourth in the 1956 Olympic games in that event, topped the old figure of 6 feet 2½ inches.

Morris Limonchik of McGill pulled off a record breaking try in the senior discus throw. He hurled the plate 139 feet, 11½ inches, besting the old mark of 130.10%.

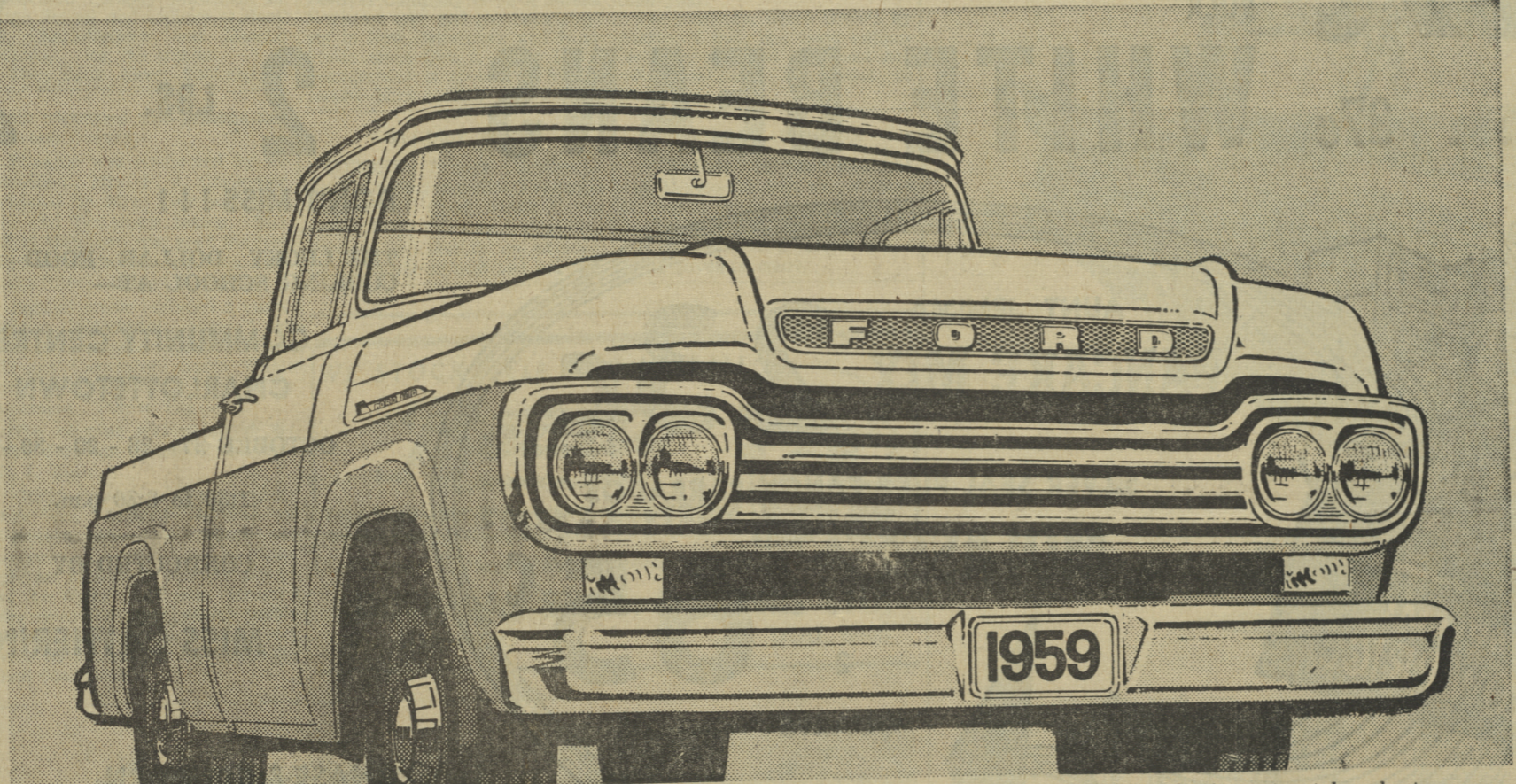

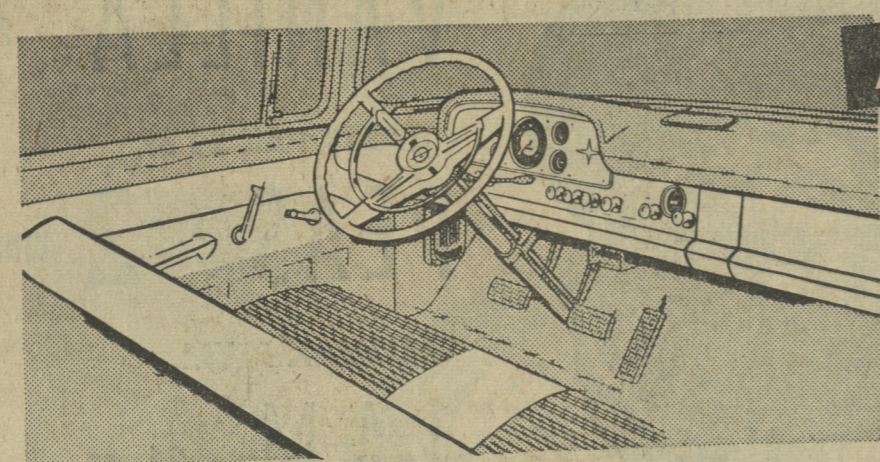
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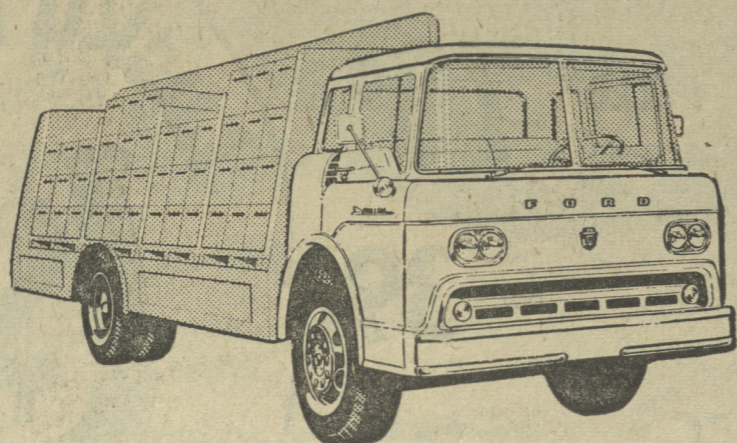
