

Barbecue Flavors Field Day Held At Rose Valley

An Illustration Station Field Day sponsored by the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, in co-operation with the Provincial Department of Agriculture was held yesterday on the farm of J. W. MacKenzie & Son, Rose Valley. It was attended by some 90 farmers. They received a hearty welcome from Gordon MacKenzie who opened the afternoon program.

A special feature of the program was a practical demonstration on the cutting of poultry for canning and barbecuing. Chickens were barbecued for the benefit of the visiting farmers. The palatable delicacy was relished by many present. Mr. L. W. Ramsay who conducted the demonstration outlined the various steps in preparing the fowl for canning and barbecuing.

USE SERVICES

Mr. S. C. Wright, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, in addressing farmers stressed the importance of field days for farmers' meetings and exhibitions. The speaker urged farmers to make use of all information and services available both in the Provincial and Do-

minion Department of Agriculture.

Farmers were invited to take an active interest in the Fall exhibition of potatoes, roots and other field crops which is to be held at Charlottetown in conjunction with the Rural Youth Field Day the latter part of September.

PROCESSING CROPS

George Wright, Horticulturist, Provincial Department of Agriculture, dealt with the subject of "Growing and processing of fruits and vegetables." He stated that many soils considered too light or unsatisfactory for the economical production of regular farm crops were found to be most suitable for certain processing crops such as peas, strawberries, beans, cauliflower, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, etc.

Yields of peas grown in P. E. I. the speaker indicated were most encouraging and much in excess of the national average. Where sufficient help was available many of these canning crops could be grown to good advantage, and profitably.

The speaker indicated that in-

land processed canned foods are the equal of and in many cases superior to imported processed vegetables. He suggested that citizens of the Province would be well advised to try some of our island products.

FATHER-SON

Mr. R. C. Parent in addressing the farmers stated the need of a satisfactory business plan between father and son in the joint operation of the home farm. This agreement, the speaker felt, should be entered upon early in the life of the boy who was to remain on the farm and make farming his vocation.

Many changes have occurred in agricultural production within recent years, the speaker intimated. The world population is increasing and must be fed. This requires that more food must be produced. Also with the growth of towns and cities and the establishment of industries available land for cultivation is decreasing. The number of farmers has also decreased within recent years. Therefore farmers today must produce more food to sustain the growing populace.

Size of farms is important and is a governing factor in the acquisition of machinery for economical production.

Farmers were invited to visit the Experimental Farm individually or in organized groups and urged to make use of the information from as many sources as possible.

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French Ponder Suez Action

PARIS (AP)—The French cabinet met for three hours Friday to decide what to do next if Egypt defies the London conference and sticks to control of the Suez Canal. Although Foreign Minister Christian Pineau said there was no immediate question of using force, the ministers met amidst growing signs it might be used if further negotiations fail.

These were some of the day's developments:

1. French consuls in Egypt warned French women and children to leave. Men too should get out, they said, unless they had compelling cause to stay.

2. A new staff command was set up in Algiers by Gen. Andre Beaufre for regrouping airborne military blow was decided. This could join British forces in case and light armored units which France has some 450,000 troops fighting nationalist rebels in Algeria.

3. French air force planes, including jet fighter-bombers, were concentrated on several fields

around Paris for possible quick transfer to the Middle East.

4. Units of the French Mediterranean fleet, led by the 35,000-ton battleship Jean Bart, headed out to sea for what the navy ministry officially called "exercises."

5. The troopship Pasteur and three freighters were standing by at Marseilles. Sixteen ships in other French ports were placed at the disposal of the defence ministry.

Although Paris evening newspapers had bold headlines announcing Nasser was campaigning for a "holy war" against the West, there was little crisis atmosphere at the cabinet met in the Elysee Palace.

Pineau, looking pale and tired, hurried into the meeting 25 minutes after it had begun. He had driven straight from the plane which had flown him home from London.

Asked at the airfield if force would be used if President Nasser said "no" to the London conference in English: "The question of force is not yet. We will have new conversations."

OTTO JOHN IS CHARGED WITH HIGH TREASON

KARLSRUHE, West Germany (Reuters) — Former West German intelligence chief Otto John, a two-way traveller across the East-West German border, Friday was charged with high treason.

The handsome, 47-year-old former lawyer posed one of the most intriguing problems of the cold war when he vanished across the East German border on July 20, 1954, only to return to the West 17 months later. A month before his "disappearance" he had returned from a tour of the United States.

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U. S. Cost Of Living At Record High

WASHINGTON (AP) — A steep July rise in consumer prices sent the United States cost of living to an all-time high Friday, and threatened the Eisenhower administration with a political headache.

The jump of 7-10ths of one per cent reported by the bureau of labor statistics meant a four-cent hourly wage increase to some 1,250,000 workers in auto, aircraft, electrical goods, farm implement and other factories.

United Auto Workers President Walter Reuther, who has called the cost-of-living pay increases "the wooden nickels of inflation," demanded a congressional inquiry. He said the probe would "expose exorbitant profits as the cause for inflation."

Senator George Smathers (Dem. Fla.), chairman of the Democratic Senate campaign committee, said the rise proves that "the Republican prosperity they talk about is no more than skin deep."

He predicted the price trend will "be reflected in the election returns."

PEAK EARNINGS

The average U.S. factory worker's take-home pay dropped about one-half of one per cent and his buying power about one per cent in the month, the BLS said.

Nevertheless, both take-home pay and real earnings were at the highest level ever recorded for July. The average U.S. factory hand with three dependents received \$72.11 a week in his pay envelope.

Tension High In Cyprus

NICOSSIA, Cyprus (Reuters) — An explosion killed one Greek Cypriot and severely injured another in the Larnaca area of southeast Cyprus Friday night while tension in the British colony was at trigger-pitch over a new terrorist threat to resume a 18-month campaign of violence.

The EOKA terrorist organization distributed leaflets in Nicosia streets Friday warning British soldiers "We are not responsible if English blood is shed again, please of blood this time."

The threat was linked with terrorist demands that Cyprus Governor Sir John Harding withdraw his call for terrorists to lay down their arms and surrender.

The call followed last week's offer of a ceasefire made by EOKA leader "Digenis" in the terrorist fight for union with Greece that has taken 415 lives in the last 18 months.

It was not immediately clear whether Friday night's explosion was political, signalling a sudden renewal of EOKA violence.

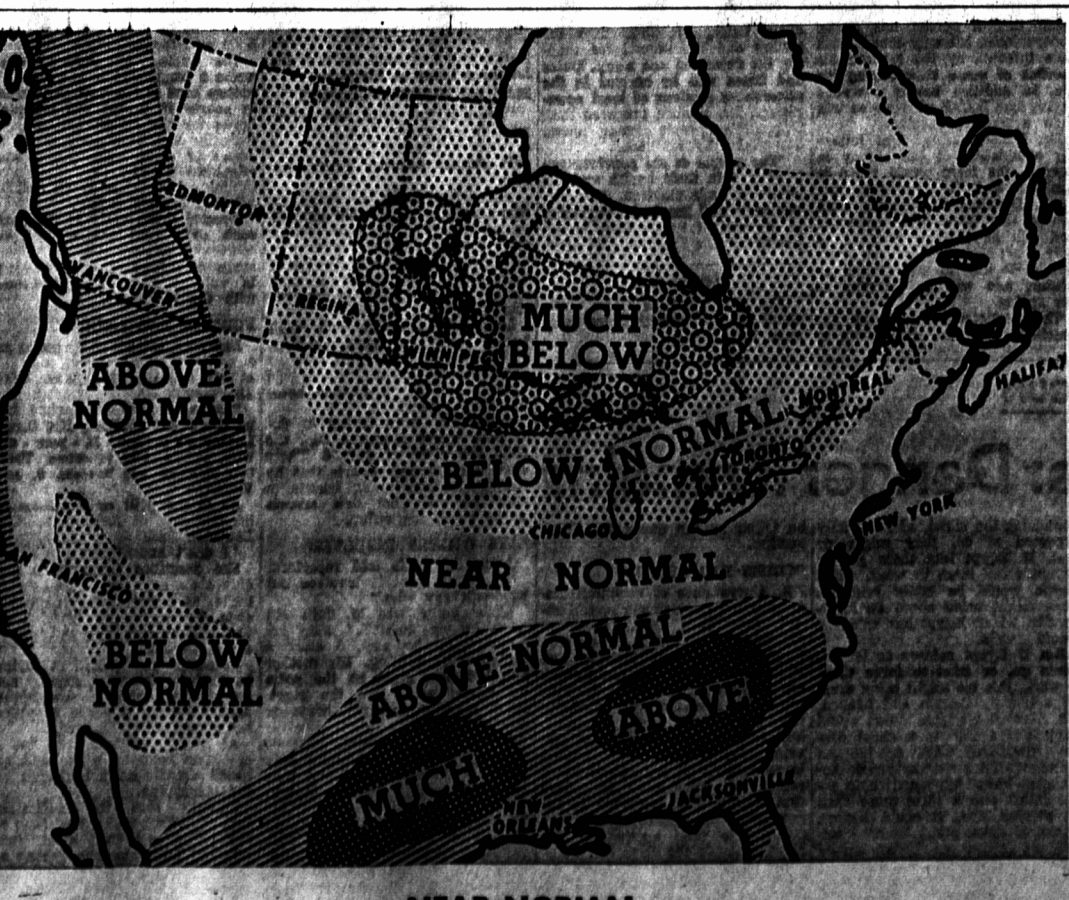
