Excavate Cellar For New School At Montague

The excavation of the cellar of the new Montague school located at the north end of the Community Welfare League grounds was completed yesterday afternoon. The excavation is approximately 110 feet long and 50 feet wide, and a depth of somewhat over seven feet. The location of this site was determined some time ago by test bore which showed a strong sedimentary rock strata lying below sub-surface level, and on this firm strata, the cement foundation of the building will be constructed. A very large volume of clay was removed by carry-all and bulldozer, and this has been deposited on the south side of the site, to be used for grading the location. The work of laying the cement foundation will be commenced in the very near future.
