

**Local and Other Items.**

The Rev. L. G. McNeill, is in Halifax.  
The City Council meets to-morrow evening.  
The Rev. Mr. Quinn will deliver a lecture in St. James' Hall this evening at 8 o'clock. Admission free.

J. HUNTER DEVAR, Inspector of Fisheries, is at the Osborna House. He remains until Thursday evening.

It is said that Hon. Mr. Baby will accompany the Minister of Marine and the Minister of Customs to this Province.

The yachts "Clara Bell" and "Carita" were sold to day at auction by W. D. Stewart, the former for \$222, the latter for \$210.

J. L. INCHES, Esq., of St. John, N. B., intends making a tour of this Province in the interests of the coming New Brunswick Exhibition.

JOHN BROGAN, arrested for breaking into Pope's Brewery, was this morning discharged on his own recognizance, to appear when required.

The Government have given Toronto over 1,000 acres of marsh land, valuable for manufacturing sites when drained, as it has a fine water front and can be intersected with canals, and is crossed by railways.

A TENANT on the Herberthshire Estate, near Denny, Scotland, has just paid his hundred and tenth half-yearly rent. The total sum he has paid in rent since entering on his farm amounts to within a little of £8,000.

THE KITTIE LOUGEE COMEDY Co. will open in the Market Hall to-morrow night with the drama entitled "Divorced, or Lost and Won." This play was never before rendered in Charlottetown. It is said to "appeal to the heart of husband, wife and mother."

HAPPENY AND O'TOOLE MATCHED.—Mr. J. Happeny and M. J. O'Toole, of Clinton, Mass., signed articles on Thursday for a ten-mile race for \$100 a side, to take place at Mystic Park (if possible) or at Milford, July 19th. Each party deposited \$25 as a forfeit. Colonel R. H. Eland, of the Boston Globe, was agreed upon as referee.

There is a bill before the Quebec Legislature to incorporate a company to be entitled the Montreal Steam Heating Company. The company is to be empowered to manufacture, sell and dispose of within Montreal City limits steam or other heat-producing articles. The capital is placed at \$500,000, and may be raised by a two-thirds vote of shareholders to \$2,000,000.

JOHN H. GATES, Esq., Sheriff, placed on exhibition at the market to-day a few stalks of orchard grass about four feet nine inches tall. This grass was introduced by Mr. Gates a few years ago, and has proved to be valuable as fodder, as it grows quickly; and, when it reaches half its full growth, it is relished by cattle. The grass, in our opinion, would be well worthy the attention of farmers and stock raisers.

We direct the attention of Mr. Holman, Road Inspector, to the bad state of North River and Malpeque Roads. North River Road, particularly, is strewn with small sharp stones, which are no benefit to the road and of great injury to horses. Many have been seriously injured by them, and farmers and others, who arrive in this city by these roads, justly complain and recommend that the stones be raked off and placed in the ruts, &c. Will the Supervisor lose time in attending to this?

The market to day was well stocked with vegetables, fowl, beef, etc. Prices as follows: Beef (small) from 7 to 14 cents per lb.; beef (qr.) from 5 to 9 cents per lb.; mutton, from 6 to 12 cents per lb.; lamb (qr.) from 25 cents to \$1; veal from 3 to 8 cents per lb.; turkeys, from \$1.00 to \$1.50; fowls, from 50 to 60 cents each; butter (fresh) from 12 to 18 cents per lb.; eggs from 10 to 12 cents per doz; hay, from 40 to 65 cents per 100 lbs.; oats, from 14 to 45 cents per bushel; potatoes from 14 to 16 cents per bushel; flour, from \$3.00 to \$3.25; oatmeal, from \$3.25 to \$3.50; chickens, from 40 to 50 cents per pair.

The Stipendiary Magistrate's Court was through this forenoon to hear the case of Heard vs. McLeod, for alleged assault. The defendant is a member of one of the leading law firms in the city, and has been for a period solicitor for the Union Bank, with which the plaintiff—Mr. Heard—has some difficulty. Plaintiff and defendant met on Richmond street yesterday, near the Young Men's Christian Association. The former greeted the latter with a smile, while the defendant remarked, "you brought me before the Grand Jury and much you made of it." The plaintiff retorted to the effect that "if the Grand Jury had done their duty they would not have failed." In the course of the conversation which followed the defendant used epithets towards Mr. Heard such as "you d—d infernal scoundrel," "you sneak," etc., and as alleged by Mr. Heard, shook his right hand in a threatening manner. Mr. Heard, in court to-day did not prove an assault, but only abusive language, which Mr. McLeod did not deny nor withdraw. He alleged that Mr. Heard gave more than sufficient provocation, having accused him of being an accessory to perjury. The case was dismissed.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

NEW YORK, July 2.  
Two deaths from yellow fever at the quarantine hospital are reported.  
Gen. Garfield on Saturday participated in the ceremony of unveiling a monument to the soldiers of Lake County, at Painsville, and at the close of his speech, said: I hope the time is not far distant when under the crossed swords and the locked shields, Americans, North and South, shall sleep in peace and rest in liberty, love and harmony under the Union of our flag of the Stars and Stripes.

A Columbia, S. C., special announces the arrest of Alexander C. Langheim, an expert employed in the office of a special commissioner, whose bills of the bank of the State of South Carolina have been funding for the past five months, on a charge of systematic wholesale robbery. A despatch says it is thought the amount will reach \$100,000, and that other persons high in authority are implicated.

HAVANA, July 3.  
There were 46 deaths from yellow fever and two from small-pox for the week ending June 25th.

LONDON, July 3.  
The action of the Commons on Gladstone's resolution permitting Bradlaugh to affirm has given great satisfaction to the supporters of the Government.

The civil tribunal of Nancy, to which the Jesuits applied to have seals removed from their establishments, has pronounced itself incompetent to judge of the question.

In the Marlborough street (Dublin) Police Court, the adjourned summons of A. M. Sullivan, M. P., charging Mr. Callan, M. P., with libel, was heard on Saturday. Callan was committed for trial and entered recognizance for £100.

CANBARRA, July 3.  
A British brigade, composed of all arms, has been ordered to move from that point on Girkirk, to support Shere Ali, who arrived from Herat a few days ago. The renewal of fighting in Afghanistan is held to demonstrate that the question of British relations to that country is about as far from settlement as ever, and that in all probability the present Ministry will soon find a new edition of the Afghan war on its hands in its attempts to impose a ruler upon the country.

SOUTHERN EXCURSIONISTS.—A Montreal despatch says: About 300 excursionists from Alabama, Georgia and other Southern States, arrived in the city this morning. The city hackmen were busily engaged in driving around shallow complexioned gentlemen in limousines and Panama hats, pointing out the sights of the city. The excursionists express themselves as delighted with the cool weather prevailing since their arrival here.

A CHANCE FOR CANADA.—France is a great importer of cattle, sheep and pigs, and it is a field as yet untried by Canadians. In the first months of 1880, 87,000 head of horned cattle, 575,000 sheep, and 95,000 pigs were imported into France. Only 131 oxen, 1,400 sheep, and 26 pigs were brought from America, the principal exporter of oxen being Italy.

A FATAL JOKE.—The St. John Globe states that the death of Miss Clara Bagnall, of Indian town, which took place a few days ago, was primarily due to a fright she got from a gentleman who wished to play a practical joke on her. This is a very sad story, but many parallels to it might be found illustrative of the heartless, insane and criminal exploits of "practical jokers."
