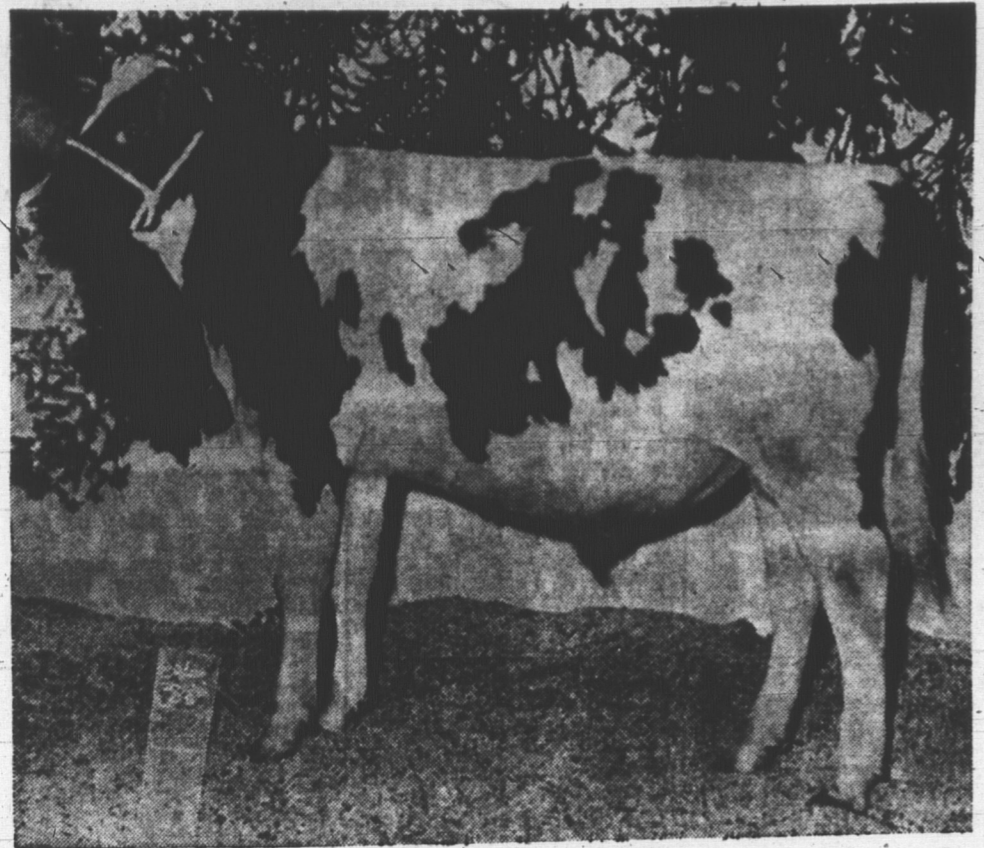


DONHOLM VICTORY'S WOODY



EAST RIVER DAIRY KING

Little York Farmers Have 2 Sires Nominated For Canadian Award

Almon Wood and Sons, Little York, have had two of their registered Ayrshire sires nominated for consideration as All Canadian.

Donholm Victory's Woody has been nominated as a yearling bull. East River Dairy King has been nominated as a bull calf. It is unusual for one breeder to have two animals nominated from his herd in the one year. The Woody bull was the first prize senior yearling bull and the grand champion at Charlottetown in August. He was the second prize yearling bull at the Atlantic Winter Fair and the bull that beat him went on to become grand champion. Indeed he was grand champion later last month at the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto.

Wallace Wood told the Guardian yesterday "we are proud of our purchase of this animal. He is the son of a cow that was only two years old when we bought her calf, so we were running a bit of a risk, as the dam had not had chance to prove herself."

But this year Woody's mother, Donholm Supreme Candy, was reserve grand champion Ayrshire female at the Royal Winter Fair. Woody was sired by Selwood Victory, a well known

Ontario bull in the artificial insemination centres.

East River Dairy King was the first prize bull calf at the Atlantic Winter Fair, Halifax, and the reserve junior champion.

Dairy King's dam, East River Fancy Girl, was the grand champion Ayrshire female at Charlottetown this year. The Fancy Girl cow was third for Canada in the list of "production stars" which has just been released. Her production was close to 15,000 pounds milk and her combined-breed class average for milk and butterfat was 185. Dairy King's sire, Donholm Betty's Star, has been classified "Excellent" which is tops for conformation, and he was grand

Passengers Had No Hint Of Trouble

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP) — Joseph C. Rogers of Saint John, one of 65 passengers aboard a CNR train which collided with a freight train 15 miles northeast of here Tuesday, said there was no warning before the crash. "We didn't know a thing," he said, "until we were dumped on the floor."

Mr. Rogers, who was in the first coach behind the locomotive, said the train was "moving at quite a speed when I heard something like a loud crack. I put my hand on the seat in front of me but landed on the floor. Another man in the seat with me landed beside me."

He said children and other passengers in the coach kept cool. "The shock was felt through the whole train, but everyone look quite well." Some children "cried a little but there was no hysteria." Two nurses who were passengers on the train said they made a check of the two coach cars and found injuries limited to a few nosebleeds received when persons bumped into seats in front of them.

Miscouche Meetings Begin On Teaching Of Religion

SUMMERSIDE — This morning a catechetical institute consisting of a two-day series of conferences and demonstrations on the teaching of religion opens at Miscouche Regional High School.

The institute, sponsored by the recently established St. Paul's Parish CCD, has as its prime purpose to better inform parents and teachers of new texts and techniques being used to "communicate the Christian message".

After leaving Queen Square School, he worked for many years at Hughes Drug Company where he made a wide circle of friends. About seven years ago, he accepted a position at the local Post Office where he was employed at the time of his death.

CNR Employees Hurt When Trains Collide

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP) — Men and equipment were working to clear the CNR's main line between Moncton and this port city Tuesday night following a morning crash between a CNR passenger train and a freight train at Nauwigewauk, 15 miles northeast of here.

Two crew members of the passenger train were injured, but the train's 65 passengers escaped with a shaking. A CNR spokesman said the line was expected to be reopened late Tuesday night or early today.

The passenger train, comprised of three coaches and two other units, replaced a regular one-car railliner on the Saint John-Moncton run before Christmas. A spokesman said the railliner is to go back into service when holiday season traffic "falls off."

Craft Named For C.B. Lakes

OTTAWA (CP) — The navy's experimental anti-submarine hydrofoil ship due to be launched in 1966 will be named HMAS Bras d'Or (Golden Arm).

The name will commemorate the hydrofoil experiments carried out by inventors Alexander Graham Bell and F. W. (Casey) Baldwin on the Bras d'Or lakes on Cape Breton Island between 1911 and 1920.

The two hydrofoil pioneers set a world water speed record of 61.5 knots.

The new submarine hunter will be 151 feet long and will displace about 200 tons. The hull is being built in Sorel, Que., by Marine Industries Ltd. under a contract awarded to de Havilland Aircraft of Canada, Toronto.

A British-built hydrofoil named Bras d'Or has been tested by the naval research establishment in Dartmouth, N.S., since 1957 and it will be renamed.

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School Has Program Of Carols

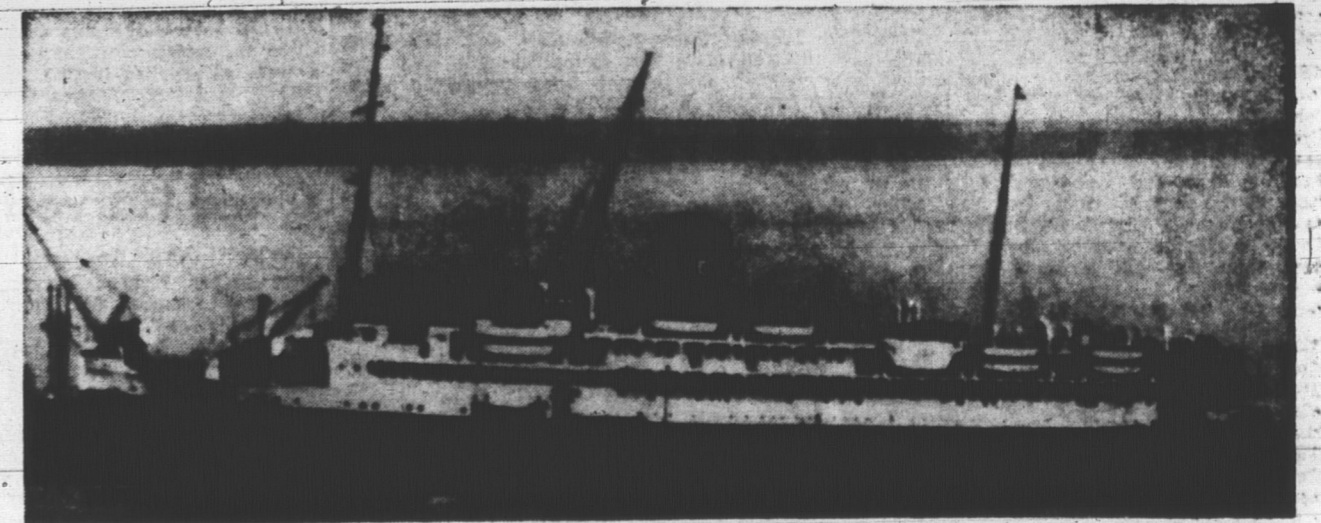

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The Yarmouth Castle Disaster

For the 375 passengers of the pleasure cruiser Yarmouth Castle, the four day cruise from Miami to Nassau was to be a holiday. Just fourteen hours after sailing, the news came through which was to shock and horrify the public. The Yarmouth Castle had sunk, a burning hulk which claimed eighty-nine lives.
