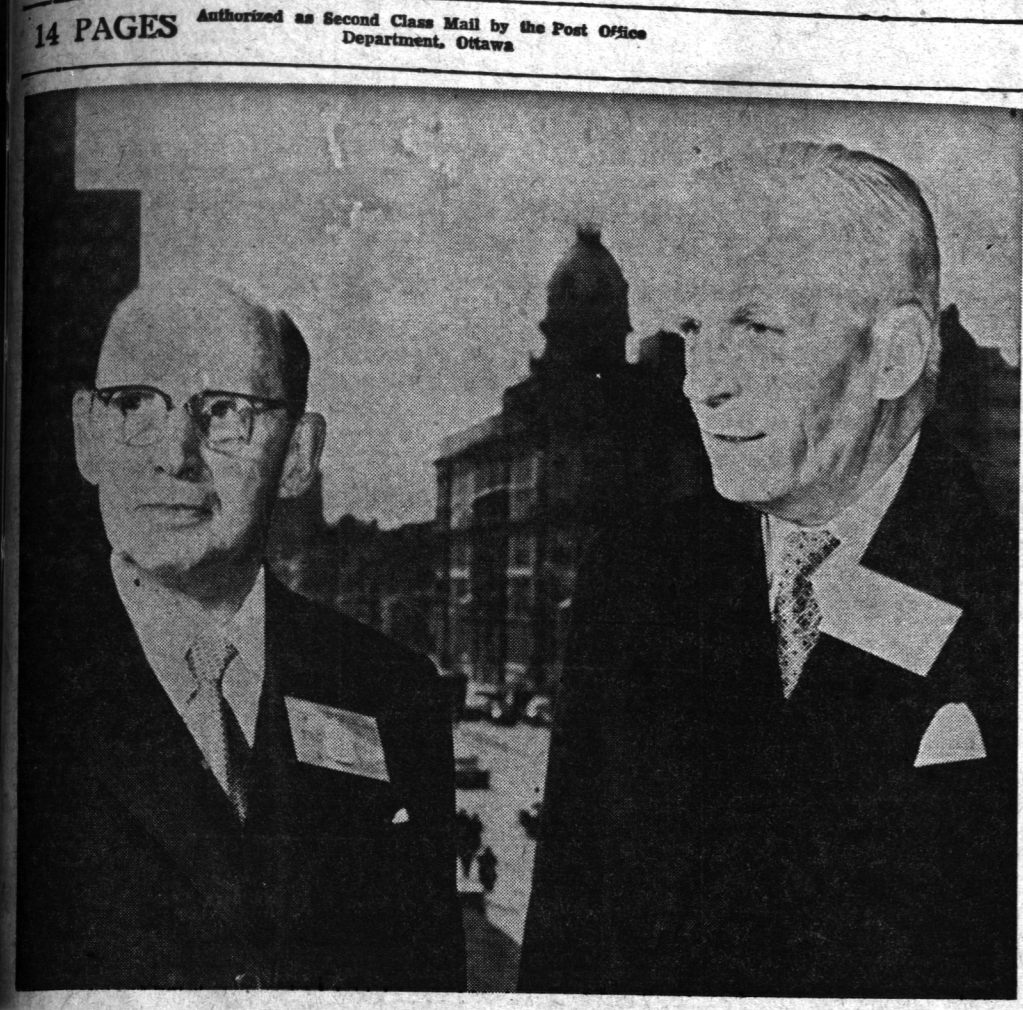

## AUSTRALIA LEADS WAY

# May Ask Soviet Union To Join In Trade Talks

MONTREAL (CP) — The Commonwealth may extend an economic olive branch to Russia. With Australia leading the way, general agreement was expressed at the Commonwealth trade conference Thursday that Russia should be approached to see whether she is willing to join in international commodity agreements designed to cushion producers against violent price fluctuations.

## Monty Ends His Military Career

The famed desert warrior of the Second World War and leader of the Allied Normandy landings gave up his post as deputy allied commander in Europe and prepared to fly home to retirement in Britain.

## EXPECT FERGUS TO LOAD SOON

# Shipping Tie-Up At St. John's Ends As Agreement Is Signed

By TONY THOMAS Canadian Press Correspondent ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — One of the most contentious labor disputes ever to develop here ended early Thursday. The 900-member Longshoremen's Protective Union and the Newfoundland Employers' Association agreed on a new contract. Details have not been disclosed. The signing ended a shipping ban begun Aug. 21 by the employers. It stopped the association's 25 vessels from calling here and since then no major shipping was handled. It will take about a week before normal activity returns to the waterfront, spokesmen said.

## CREWS AT WORK

Longshoremen went to work Thursday morning to unload a vessel at the United States Army dock. Other gangs started unloading a cargo of mahogany logs brought from Africa by the Louisa for the Newfoundland hardwoods plant. The vessel arrived several days ago and would have continued on to Clarendville, Nfld., to discharge if the waterfront dispute had not been settled.

## ISSUE NOT WAGES

The main issue boiled down to the number in a work gang. The employers wanted ships of less than 500 tons to be worked by 21-man gangs. The union wanted 29-man gangs on all ships. Wages were not in dispute.

## MAY LOAD SATURDAY

Local shippers expect that the M.V. Fergus will resume her regular run between this port and Newfoundland possibly Saturday. Chartered by the provincial government some time ago in an effort to promote greater two-way trade with the Ancient Colony, the ship has been tied up at Pictou, N.S. since the beginning of the longshoremen's strike.

## PREMIER SAYS P.E.I. TO FIGHT ANY ATTEMPT TO RAISE RATES

"P.E.I. will fight any proposal to increase freight rates," Premier A.W. Matheson said yesterday. The leader of the Island Liberal government was commenting on reports that the federal government was considering approval of the railways request for an additional 19 per cent in nationwide freight rates.

## LARGE BARN AT BATHURST BURNS

BATHURST, N.B. (CP) — A barn nearly 200 feet long, one of the largest in northern New Brunswick, was destroyed by fire of unknown origin at South Bathurst, Wednesday night, causing loss estimated by owners Bud and Paul Kenny at more than \$50,000.

## DECLINES COMMENT

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Premier Smallwood Thursday declined comment on the railways' bid for a 19 per cent freight rate increase.

## MONCTON (CP) — An Atlantic provinces protest of proposed railway freight rate increase is likely to be made by the Maritimes Transportation Commission, Manager Howard Mann said here Thursday.

## SUB MANOEUVRES

LONDON (Reuters) — German submarines Thursday took part in their first exercise with NATO naval forces. Exercise Shipshape is designed to test the evacuation of shipping from the British Isles.

## City Man Is Director Of Education Ass'n.

VICTORIA (CP) — Dr. F. E. MacDiarmid chief director and deputy minister of education in New Brunswick, Thursday was elected president of the Canadian Education Association. Dr. MacDiarmid succeeds Dr. H. L. Campbell, former deputy minister of education for British Columbia and now head of the national defence department schools in Europe.

## Gets Reward, Sentenced For Bogus Cheque

OTTAWA (CP) — Edouard Royer, Ottawa taxi driver who received \$2,000 in June for his part in the recovery of kidnapped Montreal child Joel Reisman, Thursday was given a one-year suspended sentence on a charge of fraud involving \$1,300.

## BUENOS AIRES (AP) — Argentina has signed a multi-million dollar contract to purchase oil field equipment and other capital goods in Britain. The machinery is valued at \$20,000,000 (about \$140,000,000).

## DEBATE ON RED CHINA'S ENTRY TO UNITED NATIONS IS DELAYED

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP) — The Far East crisis finally came before the United Nations Assembly Thursday, but actual consideration of Red China's admission to the world organization was postponed again.

## EXPECT NEGATIVE VOTE

Even with the delay it was generally assumed that the committee, whose members are represented geographically in about the same proportion as in the full 91 country General Assembly, will vote down once again the inclusion of Red China's representation as a topic for Assembly debate.

## HONORS FOR WILLIAMS

LONDON (Reuters) — The ashes of Dr. Ralph Vaughan Williams, distinguished composer who died last month, will be placed in Westminster Abbey today.

## P.M. Promises 'Substantial' Hike In Aid To Needy States

MONTREAL (CP) — Prime Minister Diefenbaker Thursday night pledged "substantial" boosts in Canadian aid to needy countries but did not spell out detailed plans for further commitments.

# Weapons Use Causes Concern

OTTAWA (CP) — The fisheries department plans to crack down hard on armed lobster poachers in the Maritimes. Officials are concerned over a number of recent instances of violence in which rifles and shotguns were fired and even an axe and a knife used against fishery protection officers.

## FLAGRANT POACHING

But it said there have been "reports of flagrant poaching in some areas, followed by instances of violence to fishery protection officers while carrying out their duties."

## IGNORE SIZE REGULATIONS

The poachers, he said, ignore the need to permit a certain number of lobsters to escape for spawning purposes. And they ignored the fact that lobsters just below the minimum size, if returned to the water, would almost double in size in a year.

## FIRE AT OFFICERS

A district protection officer in New Brunswick was fired on by a rifle while driving his car. Another officer's car was hit by shotgun blasts apparently aimed at his radio. On the water the small boat tender of a patrol boat was hit by shotgun pellets.

## NEED OUTSIDE HELP

Mr. Diefenbaker said the world would have to live with the problem of surplus production for many years. The Commonwealth was too small itself to solve them. Other countries had to be brought into price stabilization arrangements.
