Young Man Charged in Shooting Affair

SAINT JOHN, N. B. (CP)—Gordon Elliott, 31, in serious condition with a bullet wound in his abdomen, was charged by East Saint John police Friday with unlawful possession of an offensive weapon. Elliott has been under police guard in hospital since his capture late Thursday after a four-hour gun battle with police in a wooded section of East Saint John near his home.

Earlier, the home of Mr. and Mrs. James Hopkins, neighbors of Elliott, had three times been attacked by rifle fire. The first attack three weeks ago was written off after police investigation as "noise from firerackers."

But late Wednesday evening nine bullets tore into the home, barely missing Mrs. Hopkins and her attractive 17-year-old daughter, Muriel, and damaging the house and furnishings. Police were unable to find the assailant.

Thursday firing on the house resumed and local police and RCMP in hospital since his capture late Thursday four hours later after a sporadic exchange of shots. Elliott told police he was wounded by his own rifle when he fell while running through the brush.
