Crapaud-Springfield Rector Describes Church Army Work

St. Paul's Laymen's Association had as guest speaker at their monthly meeting held in the Parish Hall last evening, Rev. D.F.H. Minton, Rector of Crapaud-Springfield Parish. Also, speaking briefly on behalf of the forthcoming Blood Donors Clinic, Dr. R.G. Lea.

"It is vitally urgent that blood be readily available at all times and as all the blood collected here is used locally it must be admitted that we should make every effort to have sufficient available from provincial donors," Dr. Lea said. He urged the support of all present in the forthcoming clinic.

Rev. Mr. Minton spoke on the work and position of the church Army within the Church. He described his entry into the Church Army with a commission as Captain when 17 years of age, and his experience until interrupted by war service.

FOUNDED IN 1882

The organization was founded in 1882 in England by Wilson Carlisle, who belonged to the Plymouth Brethren. His ambition was to bring physical and spiritual help to the roughneck districts of London. Later Carlisle and his wife became members of the Anglican Church and he developed a training school for Church Army workers.

The organization now deals very fully with prison aid, rescue homes, unmarried mothers with the Sisters of the women's branch of the Church Army playing an important part, in the 66 divisions of the work. "The work of the organization is widely known and appreciated in England and I am hoping to see the movement now in Canada develop as time goes on," Mr. Minton said.

Introduced by president Tom DeBlois, the speaker was thanked for his highly interesting talk by Cecil Miller. Gordon Roper, reporting on behalf of the Scout Group committee said that 17 Scouts and 24 Cubs were in training under Blanchard Mahon, Dave Walker and Dave Ives. This entire development has taken place within a year.

Plans Made For Ch'town Blood Clinics

Plans for the Red Cross blood donor clinic to be held at Trinity Social Hall in Charlottetown on December 1st and 2nd, were finalized at a check-up meeting of the Charlottetown committee held Tuesday evening at Red Cross headquarters.

In receiving reports on the different tasks allotted to each of the members of his committee, Fremont Archer paid tribute to the lady members who have done such an excellent job of contacting the various organizations with regard to having doctors speak at their meetings, and to Dr. John Craig for arranging the schedule with the doctors.

The Charlottetown committee is seeking 1200 donors in the two-day period. The achieving of this ambitious objective will depend upon a record attendance of citizens of Charlottetown and the surrounding districts during all the hours that the clinics will be in session.

All those who can possibly do so are being urged to come to the morning and afternoon sessions and so avoid over-crowding long waits at the two evening clinics, and assuring a capacity attendance during all the other hours. For the past few years the afternoon hours of the clinics have been between 2 and 4, but the committee has decided to change to between 3 and 5:30 in order to make it more convenient for many to drop in at the clinic on their way home from work.
