MIGHT HAVE BEEN SERIOUS.—Mr. Chas. Morrison, of Alberton, and Mr. Chas. Dalton, of Tignish, were returning from a day's goose shooting, this week, at Casumpego Bay. While crossing the Channel, the ice gave way, precipitating Mr. Morrison into the water. A swift tide was running at the time, and, but for the prompt assistance of Mr. Dalton, aided by the presence of mind and skill of a swimmer of Mr. Morrison, it might have been our sad duty to record an addition to the long list of this season's drowning accidents. We congratulate Mr. Morrison on his providential escape.

FROM GEORGETOWN.—Georgetown advices of the 24th are as follows: The schooner Jewel, which was stranded at launching last fall, was, after considerable work, successfully floated and arrived here yesterday in charge of Pilot Hamphill, who with the owner, has been working on her for some time. Captain Young says the Jewel is as good as ever, and will proceed with her to Pictou to-morrow, when she will be put on the slip and then load coal for Lunenburg. The ice has entirely disappeared from the rivers, and none is visible outside in any direction. The herring fishery is good, and the fishermen are prepared to bait any number of bankers.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, April 25.

The Speaker took the chair at three o'clock.

On motion of Sir John Macdonald, it was resolved that Government business should have precedence on Mondays for the remainder of the session. The Government already had all the other days.

Hon. Mr. Chapleau moved the third reading of the bill amending the franchise act. The amendments by Brien reducing the income qualification from \$500 to \$250, and by Mills of Bothwell that an elector should vote only in the constituency where he resides, was lost after division, and the bill was read a third time.

In committee on the Banking Bill, a long discussion took place on the clause respecting over issue of notes. It was contended that the informant should not be allowed to participate in the fines imposed for this offence, and also that penalties should not be imposed in consequence of unintentional over-issue. The clause was, however, passed without alteration, save the addition of a provision that the fines imposed should not form a charge on the assets in the event of failure, until all other claims were paid. Ellis moved to strike out the provision that the Government should have a first claim after payment of notes in case of insolvency. He thought the Crown should have no priority.

Sir John Thompson, Hon. George E. Foster and Sir John Macdonald showed that the Government were compelled to have Government funds deposited so promiscuously in banks, large and small, all over the country, and that it was a necessity to have security such as that provided. The amendment was lost. The Committee then rose, the bill to be taken up again on Monday evening.

The House then went into Committee of Supply, taking the supplementary estimates and adjourned at two o'clock.

Payment Suspended.

NEW YORK, April 25.

The Doran Wright Company, one of the largest bucket shops in existence, with branches all over the country, suspended payment to-day. No information could be gained at the office of the concern. Both partners are absent from the city. Later in the day, at the office of Doran & Wright, the reports of suspension were denied. It was stated that one of the firm was on his way to New York and would take charge of affairs here to-morrow. On the streets it is rumored that the firm were badly hurt in the recent advance in the stock market but hoped to pull through.

Civil Service Examinations.

OTTAWA, April 25.

A promotion examination for persons in the civil service of Canada will be held at the various places authorized by the Civil Service Act, on May 26th next. There are at present 25 vacancies in the inside service, and 49 in the outside service of the department of customs, and 34 in the post office department.

CAIRO, April 25.

A Coptic clerk, employed by Emin Bey while Emin was a Watteli, has made a sworn disposition to the effect that the revolt of Emin's forces was solely due to the discovery of Emin's plan to surrender his province to the Mahdi.

On the Free List.

WASHINGTON, April 25.

Representative Bland of Missouri, to-day introduced in the House a bill to reduce taxes by placing on the free list all imported goods exchanged in foreign countries for farm products.

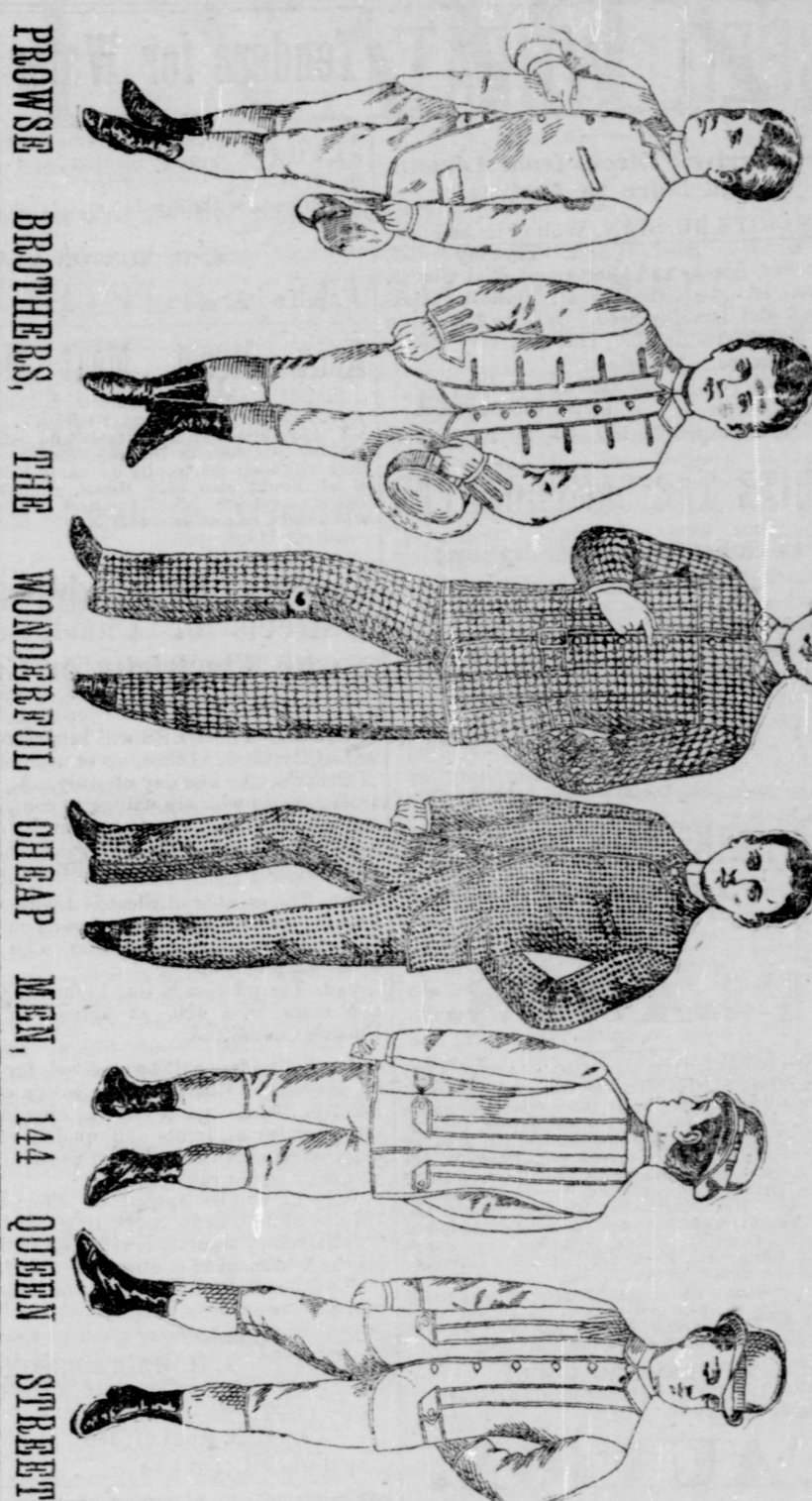
