

Ancient Biblical City Of Gibeon Reported Found

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—American archaeologists have discovered the Biblical Israelite city of Gibeon near el-Jib eight miles north of Jerusalem.

Gibeon, mentioned 43 times in the Bible, is described in the old testament as "one of the royal cities." Archaeologists believe, the Jewish city was built before 1200 BC and was at the peak of its life from 800 to 600 BC.

The University of Pennsylvania Museum announced the discovery Saturday. It said parts of Gibeon's fortification and its water system had been excavated during the summer by an expedition sponsored by the museum and the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, Berkeley, Calif.

JARS FOUND

Identification of el-Jib as the site of Gibeon came with the discovery of three storage jars, inscribed in Hebrew script with the address of their owner, the announcement said.

The jars covered an area of about 16 acres, the museum said, and was surrounded by a 10-foot wide wall enlarged at vital points to 26 feet where fortified towers were built.

"The most spectacular discovery," the announcement said, "was a pool cut from the solid rock and large enough to contain a three-storey house.

"It is believed that this pool is that mentioned in chapter 2 of the Second Book of Samuel, as the scene of the famous match between the men of Abner, Saul's captain, and Joab, captain of David's forces."

STAIRWAY FOUND

The expedition was said to have dug in the pool for seven weeks without finding the bottom. They had followed a stone, circular stairway 35 feet down which served, it was said, as an access for the Gibeon people to the pool's water level.

The capacity of the excavated portion of the pool was estimated at 200,000 gallons.

The museum said archaeologists had established the sites of five different cities in the area, the earliest of which appeared to have been built about 3,000 BC. It said complete excavation would require a number of years. Areas excavated this year were rented from land owners.



PASSENGER INJURED WHEN CAR HITS TREE

At about 8.15 last evening a car received serious damage when it crashed into a tree on Fitzroy Street, near the intersection of Fitzroy and Edward. The accident occurred when the driver of the car stopped the vehicle and alighted, apparently to speak to a passenger. A young lady who was a passenger in the front seat moved over behind the wheel and started the car causing it to mount the curb and hit the tree. Harris Dingwell, one of the two passengers in the rear seat apparently received injuries when he was thrown forward by the impact. He was taken to the P. E. I. Hospital by MacLean's Ambulance, it was later reported that he was suffering from a dislocated shoulder. The remaining three passengers, a male and two females, apparently received nothing more than a severe shaking up. The front end of the car was damaged to a considerable extent, amounting to several hundred dollars. The wrecked vehicle is shown above jammed against the tree.

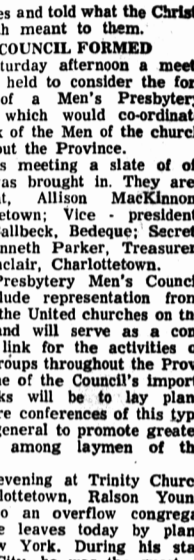
