## Traffic Halted Two Hours By Central Bedeque Accident

SUMMERSIDE — An accident at Central Bedeque late yesterday afternoon tied traffic up for close to two hours.

The accident occurred when an Irving Oil tractor trailer driven by Leslaw Murray of Charlottetown came upon a two-car collision in a narrow cutting on the long curve on Highway 1A at Central Bedeque. Rather than strike the cars, the driver directed his vehicle into a snowbank. The tanker was proceeding towards Summerside at the time.

The accident occurred at approximately 9:50 and traffic was at a standstill from then until close to 6 p.m. Cars were lined up on each side of the accident for close to half a mile.

After snow had been cleared around the tanker a payloader pulled in back onto the highway.

The vehicles involved in the head-on collision were a 1964 model driven by Arthur Baxter House of Charlottetown and a 1963 model driven by Robert Wayne Lawson of New Brunswick. Damage to the House vehicle was approximately \$150 and to Lawson's car, \$200.

## Soldier Dies In Accident

OTTAWA (CP) — Two Canadian soldiers are in good condition in a British military hospital at Iserlohn, Germany, after they suffered minor injuries in a car accident in which the driver died.

The defence department said Wednesday Pte. Nelson Bishop of Weymouth, N.S., and Pte. Robert Conrad of Musquodoboit, N.S., were riding with Pte. J. L. Compagnon of Agathias, N.S., near Soest, Germany, Saturday when their car ran off the road and struck three trees. Compagnon was killed.

The soldiers are members of the 1st Battalion, Royal Canadian Regiment, stationed near Soest. The unit is part of the Canadian NATO brigade.

The Commons continued study of the Canada Pension Plan after defeat of a Speaker's ruling on a matter of privilege.

New Democrat Leader Douglas raised the point of privilege because of a newspaper story that some NDP members got fraudulent votes in 1963.

Speaker Macgregor ruled there was no proper basis for a motion to have the government investigate the matter.

The ruling was contested and the combined opposition voted down the Liberals 114 to 108.

After a stormy discussion period a motion was approved to have the matter investigated.

On the pension plan, the Conservatives moved an amendment to extend benefits to those not going under the present proposal.

The Commons meets at 2:30 p.m. to continue study of the plan. The Senate stands adjourned until March 2.

## Family Of Seven Homeless; Relief Fund Is Established

SUMMERSIDE — A Middleton family of seven was left homeless yesterday when their large wooden frame house burned to the ground.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Mulligan caught fire at approximately 10 o'clock yesterday morning and despite efforts of the Kinkora Fire Department, which was on the scene minutes after receiving the call, was completely destroyed.

Everything, including personal belongings, was lost in the fire and Mr. Mulligan, who was home alone at the time, suffered burns to his hands and face.

He was taken to Prince County Hospital where he was attended by Dr. Henry Moyses. The burns were said not serious and Mr. Mulligan was reported resting satisfactorily last night.

At the time of the fire Mr. Mulligan was working at McIver's grocery store in Kinkora and the couple's five children were in school.

## Rumors Of Kent Street Changes Meet Both Conformation, Denial

Strong rumors of changes of property ownership along various sectors of Kent Street met with either confirmation or denial following reports published yesterday.

Involved in the reports were corner properties, all on Kent Street, with one at the intersection of Great George Street and the other two at Prince Street.

Of the latter one rumor concerned the building of a curate store by an internationally-known company on the northeast corner, but a spokesman for the Herzog property located there flatly denied the place had been sold and stated efforts to purchase it had met with refusal by the present owners.

The other deal with the southeast corner where a sprawling old building houses Johnson's Mayfair Restaurant and Nelson's Barber Shop as well as several apartments.

**NEW LEASE**  
Mr. Squarbriggs, operator of the Mayfair, is believed to have a five-year lease, recently renewed, but tenants in the apartments to the east of the restaurant have been notified to move.

It is reported the new owners plan on building an extension at the rear of this section and making one or two stores on the ground level.

The tenants in the old building on the southeast corner of Kent and Great George have received notification to vacate. However, it is believed Fred Lambros, operator of the long established tobacco stand, barber shop, shoeshine stand and news stand, still has two months before his lease expires.

Another new building, under construction on the site of the old Simpsons-Sears store one block west on Kent Street, is expected to be ready for occupancy in the near future and will add to the many changes in the face of that thoroughfare.

**CONSTRUCTION HIGH**  
Along with the new apartment building on Euston Street, and other structures of the same type rumored under consideration, as well as many new homes being planned, construction in the city is expected to remain at a high level.

But it is not expected to reach, nor even approach the heights of the past two years due to

lack of major projects such as the Confederation Memorial Buildings and the new provincial government building the costs of which still building permit values, soaring in 1963 and 1964.

However, the proposed extension to Spring Park School and hints by the City School Board that a Charlottetown High School was under consideration could greatly increase construction values in the city even though no new industrial building appears in sight.
