SUMMERSIDE — A fine of \$160 and costs or two months was passed on Andrew Joseph Gallant, Abram's Village, after he pleaded guilty to a charge of driving a motor vehicle on the highway in a manner dangerous to the public before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald, in County Court yesterday.

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St. Mary's Anglican Church Holds Advent Service Here

SUMMERSIDE — St. Mary's Anglican Church held an advent service of lessons and carols Sunday night before a large congregation.

Singing was led by the newly formed St. Mary's Boys Choir, under the direction of Eric Jones. Additional anthems were sung by Mrs. Michael Buley and Miss Hildred Jones, and by junior auxiliary members Cindy Yull, Vicky Lickman, Roberta Standing, Mary Jane Loggie, Dechis Strongman, and Deanna Strongman.

Lessons from Isaiah, the Acts of the Apostles, and the Revelation of St. John the Divine were read by John Smedley, Gerald Daley, and the rector of St. Mary's, the Rev. Robert Tuck. Mr. Tuck, in his introduction, explained that the service was for Advent, not Christmas. He said that it had become the practise in recent years due to the commercialization of Christmas to celebrate the Nativity of Christ before Christmas, rather than in the 12 days of Christmas between Dec. 25, and Jan 6, as formerly. This tended to obscure the season of Advent, with its own tradition of beautiful music and meaningful teaching.
