**CASE OF THE WEST INDIES.**

A GREAT deal of interest is felt in the case of the people of the British West India Islands. Their case is a hard one. Their chief production is sugar. Given a fair field they would prosper. But their sugar products are undersold in the markets by those of the bounty fed sugar producers of Germany and France. Against the bounties Free Trade with Great Britain will afford no compensating advantage. The British people and other people, purchase the cheaper. German and French sugars, while the British planted in West Indies sink gradually, after a brave struggle beneath the weight of the bounties. The case is rendered all the harder by the recent cession of Porto Rico to the United States and the changed relations of Cuba and the States. These sugar producing islands will now have an advantage in the American markets which they did not before possess; and the future of British West Indies is rendered so much the worse. The case of the people of the West Indies calls for immediate, careful and decisive action.

**THE VIRTUE OF DISCONTENT.**

Professor Robertson, in his annual report for 1897 makes some remarks under this heading which are worthy of consideration. The Professor says:

The best resource of the province is undoubtedly the enterprising people who have come here to make their homes. I would venture to call them a discontented people, but I use the word in its best sense. Probably, there are only two classes of men who never know discontent; the thoroughly bad man who is never discontented with himself, not hoping or desiring any thing better; and the man who is just dead. The people of Manitoba are full of ambition, aspiration and hopefulness. These virtues buoy up their spirits during the years of adversity and disappointment which unavoidably come to any people when they are feeling their way and paying for their experience, in trying to make the best of new conditions.

"To make your province rich in a safe way you must multiply your sources of revenue. It will be advantageous to pay a good deal of attention to milch cows, to feed herds of swine, to keep in places where suitable flocks of sheep, and on every farm, large numbers of poultry. Why do not Manitobans raise turkeys enough to pay for all the groceries and dry goods bought for farmers' homes? By such methods of farming, Manitobans may have a revenue from their farms every month. That can be assured only by drawing it from many sources."

These remarks are addressed to farmers who have hitherto confined their attention to the production of wheat. But farmers even in this Province may profit by them. While making a specialty of one product, as horses or cattle or cheese or butter or pigs, it is well for each farmer to generalize a little in respect to other things and not depend wholly upon one source of revenue, being careful, of course, to have everything of the best quality.

**ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.**

Montreal Gazette: A crusade against gum chewing is the latest evidence of moral reform activity in Toronto. Some future Laurier may yet spend a quarter of a million dollars of public money to discover if Quebec agrees with the other provinces on the advisability of prohibiting the manufacture, importation and sale of the jaw-exerting compound.

Montreal Star: That there is discontent among Liberals with the Laurier Government, is so patent a fact that one can appeal to the Liberal press itself for proof. Hardly a day goes by that a Liberal journal does not come to the exchange table with a strong and resentful complaint against this Administration, which is Liberal in name, partially Liberal in composition, though well-nigh the antithesis of Liberal professions in practice.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS.**

Our City School Board would do well to follow the example of the Toronto Board in abolishing long "home lessons." It is bad enough for grown up men and women to have to sit up at nights working their brains. Children ought to have a chance to sleep and grow.

The report that Sir Richard Cartwright will retire from the Cabinet and become High Commissioner for Canada in Great Britain has been revived. At any rate, Sir Richard will not again, we venture to say, face a Canadian constituency. Every promise, every pledge, every principle made or declared by him while in opposition has been belied by the Laurier Government. He must have a face of brass to be able to stand up before the old Liberals, who have been deceiving and indulged in. We are not surprised to hear that Sir Richard contemplates retiring from a cabinet which has Tarte, Sifton and Blair as the heads of our spending departments.

The Matin of Paris says that the health of the premier, M Brison, is such that he wishes to retire from the cabinet and is considering with the President the choice of his successor, which may possibly be M Bourgeois, the present minister of education.

Advices from West Africa state that the Imperial government has bought Akassa, in Morocco, near the mouth of the river Noou from the Royal Niger Company. Akassa has been the Niger Company's distributing depot and headquarters for many years. It is understood that a general depot will be established there.

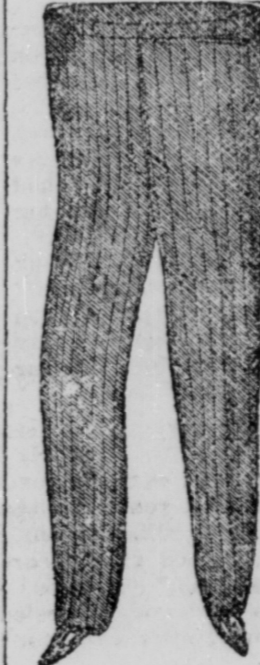
