Members of the board present were Earl Atkinson, president; C.

R. Leard, secretary; and Kell Ramsay, Ed Turner, Bernard Shea and Ralph Adams. Following the inspection Mr. Greenough stated some action would definitely be taken in response to the resolution put forward by the West Prince Board of Trade.

The superintendent was accompanied by divisional engineer E. C. Matthews and his secretary Mr. A. Walter MacNeill.

### Kinkora and Kensington To Have Blood Donor Clinics

Under the leadership of Mr. Pope McMahon, a Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic is to be held at Kinkora School on Wednesday afternoon, June 25th. This will be the first time a clinic of this kind has ever been held in Kinkora and Mr. McMahon has enthusiastic committee members canvassing for donors in several of the near-by districts. Representatives of Kinkora Sub-division of the Catholic Women's League have generously offered to provide refreshments and workers for the clinic and are also among those soliciting donors in the various districts.

To outline the steps to be taken for a successful clinic, Mr. P. A. S. Jones, Provincial Chairman — of the Red Cross Blood Donor Committee, met

with representatives of the Kinkora committee recently. Mr. S. E. Peppin, secretary of the Kensington Branch of the Canadian Legion, also attended this meeting since the Kensington Branch is sponsoring a blood clinic in their home on Wednesday evening.

The holding of these two clinics on the same day will give all the eligible residents in this section of Prince County the opportunity of attending one or the other of these clinics. However, each centre is vying with the other — as well as with all the other places in which clinics of this kind are held during the year — for possession of the Manning Trophy awarded for the centre exceeding the highest percentage of its quota.

### Maritime Air Command Head To Visit Summerside Station

Air Commodore Martin Costello, air officer commanding Maritime Air Command will visit RCAF Station, Summerside on Thursday, June 19th. This will be Air Commodore Costello's last official inspection of the Island station prior to his retirement in July. He has held the post as head of Maritime Air Command since August, 1954.

Air Commodore Costello's retirement follows 30 years of distinguished service with the RCAF, which has been climaxed by his leadership of Maritime Air Command. His period of service with this command, which is becoming increasingly important in the face of the growing submarine threat, saw the buildup of the Maritime force and a greatly improved operational

capacity. The focal point of this buildup was reached with the entry of the new Argus sub-killer aircraft into M.A.C. service this month.

Air Commodore Martin Costello, was born at Alexandria, Ont., in December 1904. He received his early education there and entered Royal Military College at Kingston, Ont., on graduation from High School. He was graduated from RMC in 1928, and was appointed to a commission in the RCAF regular force that same year.
