DEATH OF PARNELL.

What Archbishop O'Brien Says

About the Deceased Irish Leader.

HALIFAX, Oct. 8. Archbishop O'Brien, in the course of an interview, referring to the death of Charles Stewart Parnell, said: "Parnell's death will make it easier to perfectly settle the difficulties which his conduct brought about. The two factions will now be left free to unite. Parnell was dead politically twelve months ago, and his demise is now a matter of small consequence. There are no strong men left in the Parnellite ranks to carry the dead leader's standard. The men who stuck to him will now be either merged with the Irish party or they will retire from political life. Parnell was a dictator, and it is not likely that ever again will the party acknowledge any man as they did him. This will not be altogether a disadvantage, for though the circumstances of a party or a country sometimes demand an almost irresponsible leader, it is by no means always best to have power so vested in one man. It succeeded in the case of Parnell for a time, but he had not the perception to step down when his usefulness was gone. Had he retired, when he should have done so, he might have gone down with some glory, and his party and the country might have reaped the full benefit of his services. It will be just as well, probably, if Ireland never has another leader to exercise such dictation. The termination of Parnell's case is one of the saddest events in modern history. That a man of such influence, so loved by his followers, and whom his enemies could not subdue, a man who had the Government press and prejudice arrayed against him, should destroy himself by unbridling passion, is indeed sad. It is melancholy to think that a great man should thus throw himself away. The Irish people will not write Parnell's faults in brass and his virtues in sand, but in this case they will forget his evil deeds and remember the good and the heroic. His good works will live after him, and the evil will be interred with his body."

OTTAWA, Oct. 8. It is understood that the Canadian Pacific and Commercial Cable Company have secured a controlling interest in the Halifax and Bermuda Cable Company with a view to extending the system to the British West Indies.

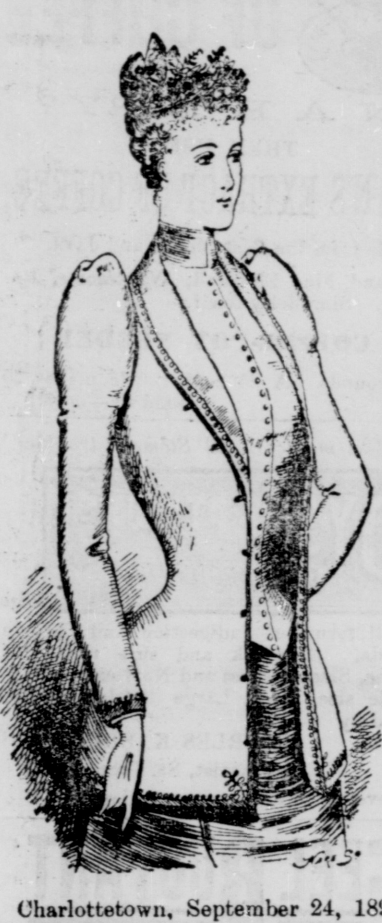
