Testify At Hearing In Criminal Negligence

SUMMERSIDE — Four witnesses were heard in court today in the criminal negligence case of a motor vehicle, against Ronald Alexander MacPherson of Summerside.

The charges resulted from a highway accident at Carleton on May 9, 1962, when Betty McKenna of Borden was struck by a car driven by Mr. MacPherson, as she was leaving a school bus.

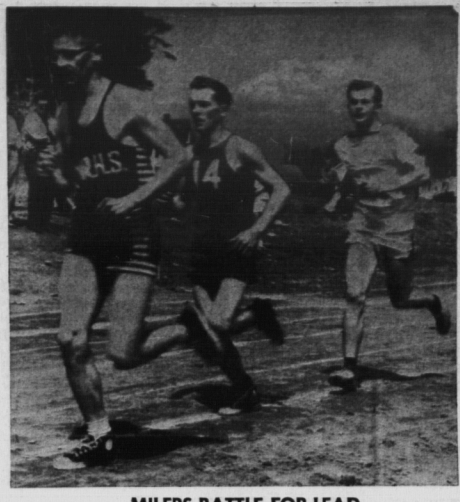
The first witness last night was Mrs. Ruth of the RCMP criminal selection laboratory in Sackville, N.B., whose evidence revealed an alcohol test of 1.3 per cent in vomit from the defendant.

Dr. John Bonnell of Bedfordshire described the injuries Miss McKenna suffered in the accident, with compound fractures of the legs, and said she would be hospitalized for a least six months.

Ralph DesRoches, driver of the bus from above, whose insured student had departed just before the accident, gave evidence concerning the accident, and said the girl was about three feet on the right hand side of the white centre line in the road when struck.

Adel Howat of Carleton told of seeing the accident through a restaurant window.

The preliminary hearing was adjourned to 9:30 advanced summer time on Saturday, June 9. George R. Mahon is conducting the case for the Crown, while Mr. MacPherson is represented by J. Watson MacNaught, Q.C.

Through your years of service as a teacher and a member of the Association you have been an important part in the growth of Alberta."

Mr. Court taught in Alberta child schools for 14 years and was principal of Taber High School for the last 19 years, before he retired in June of last year.

Previously, he had taught in Alberta for 14 years and was in charge of the teacher training at the University of Western Ontario before going to Alberta.

Mr. Court took his Bachelor of Arts degree from the University and his Bachelor of Education degree at the University of Alberta.

CAR DAMAGED IN ROUGH RIDE

SUMMERSIDE — A broken front end was reported as the cause of a car accident on Water Street West about 7 p.m. last evening which sent a 1953 Ford coupe careening out of control, sidwiping a couple of telephone poles, striking a cement post which stopped the forward motion of the car, leaving the front end hanging precariously over the sea wall above the waters of Summerside harbor.

Dennis Saultner of Summerside, driver of the car, said that when the vehicle failed to clear the post, he lost complete control, and almost throwing him out of the door which opened.

John Harper, a young man from St. Elizabeth's, and also a passenger in the car received a slight bump on the head from the impact but was not injured.

Summerside police investigating the accident, and the car was towed from the area due to the front end of the vehicle being extensively damaged.

Wheeler Stolen From Vehicle

SUMMERSIDE — A tire and wheel was stolen Sunday night from a 1954 Dodge car on the parking lot of Willard MacDonald Ltd., Summerside.

The theft was performed by jacking the car up, removing the wheel and tire, and lowering the car axle onto a stone so that the jack could be recovered.

Several thefts of this nature have occurred from the parking lot of MacDonald beside his Dodge sales building on First Street less than one block from the Summerside police station.

Police Head Dismissed After Probe

MONTREAL (CP) — Chief of Police L. J. Lacombe, head of the Quebec Provincial Police, was dismissed from office Monday on the charge that he had suppressed the report of a robbery at St. Jean, St. Jacques, 30 miles north of Montreal.

The charges against the corporal were made by Joseph Brunet, QPP director general, on his return to duty after a long illness.

Chief Lacombe led an eight-man police stakeout at the bank which ended in the death of the manager, Gerard Moudor, of the nearby St. Gabriel de Brandon, on his ball at the time in connection with other robberies.

Two other gunmen later were given the go-ahead by the director.

Director-General Brunet said his investigation showed that Lacombe had suppressed the ammunition from a Rawdon Hardware store for Moudor's murder.

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'Abbie' Due In Mid-June

The car ferry Abbie will be expected back from dry-docked in mid-June, a CNR official said yesterday. The ferry is undergoing her annual refit in Halifax.

While she is away the service is being carried on by the new MV Confederation, SS Prince Edward Island and SS Scotia II. What arrangements will be made when all four ships are in service has not been considered as yet, it was stated.

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Old Train Retires

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Pope John Has Advice For Newspaper Editors

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John suggested Monday that newspaper editors submit to a discipline of not writing in the service of this or that opposing party.

Journalists accused Pope John said journalists are sometimes accused of not always correcting "an error or an exaggeration in conformity with the requirements of perfect loyalty to the reader."

"It is up to your professional conscience to wipe out any bias or prejudice."

Pope John also spoke to the editors about the forthcoming ecumenical council of the Roman Catholic Church, which he said would be held in Rome in 1963.

He said he hoped the council, opening here Oct. 11, would have "beneficial influence" on the "frontiers of the Catholic Church" and on "all men of good will."

To achieve this, he said, the press is indispensable. He added that a special press office had been set up for the ecumenical council would be expanded.

Case Is Adjourned To Allow Lab Technicians To Be Called

In order that additional Crown witnesses may be brought in the case of Henry Joseph Kelly, Dromore, was adjourned until Friday, June 1 following the hearing of two witnesses at a special sitting of Queens County magistrate's court last night at Borden.

High Altitude Nuclear Tests To Start Soon

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new series of American high-altitude nuclear tests will be started in about four days over Johnston Island in the Pacific, the Atomic Energy Commission informed Senator Orm E. Long (Dem. Hawaii) Monday.

The first test, Long said, will be in the sub-megaton range and exploded at an altitude of 10 kilometers. A megaton is the equivalent of 1,000,000 tons of TNT.

This will be followed by two explosions in the ionosphere at an altitude of hundreds of kilometers. One will be in the megaton range and one less than a megaton.

Depending upon the results of those first three tests, Long said, a fourth may be fired on an intermediate altitude.

Long said the AEC advised him that observers in Hawaii will be able to see the glow of the first detonation and the fireballs of the latter two.

Johnston Island is about 700 miles from Hawaii.
