Higher Qualifications For Teachers Raised

The Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation, at a convention opened at Queen Charlotte High School yesterday with close to 80 members in attendance to hear an address by federation president, Frank Costello, and to discuss a resolution aimed at raising teaching standards. To raise minimum standards for two years beyond grade 12 "will be a realization of a goal of P.E.I.T.F. for some time," he said.

Such a noteworthy step as this on certification, will now bring us closer to the realization of the objective of CITP on this matter, which is the possession of a degree by every teacher," he said. Mr. Costello said in another part of his address that the Canadian Teachers' Federation "most concerned with the possibility that teachers may be included in the Unemployment Insurance Act."

Teachers would be brought under the unemployment act, if the federal government follows a suggestion contained in the Gill Commission Report. "Hon. L. George Dewar, M.D., was unable to attend the convention yesterday morning, and will give his address tomorrow morning. Charlottetown Mayor A. W. MacNeil, in a short talk, welcomed the large gathering to the city and gave a brief rundown of the community's present educational program.

READING OBJECTIVES
Miss Elinor MacDonald, liaison teacher, Charlottetown schools, in an afternoon study group outlined the basic goals of teaching and intermediate reading. "Reading—Improving Instruction." "The teaching standards of the primary and elementary grades," Miss MacDonald said, "the following six basic goals must be kept in mind: To broaden the vision of the reader; make life richer and more meaningful for the student; enable the reader to meet practical needs of life more effectively; develop social understanding; use reading in an intelligent search for the truth; and to promote a common culture and a growing appreciation of the finer aspects of life."
