FROM BOSTON.—The steamer Carroll, Captain Hansen, arrived from Boston via intermediate ports at a late hour last night, bringing a general cargo and the following passengers: Mrs. Kilson, Miss Fressidder, Mr. A. POLICE COURT.—This forenoon Thomas White, for being drunk and disorderly on the 11th, was fined \$2 or 3 days; and Robert Bayle, for a similar offence on the same date, was fined \$10 or 20 days, with the promise of six months in jail the next time he appeared. The defendant in an assault case was fined 50 cents and costs, and another case was dismissed.

Y. M. C. A.—The Devotional Committee of the Y. M. C. A. propose making a change in their Sunday afternoon service during the summer months. In the future, instead of a meeting at 4 o'clock, there will be a Bible Class. A course of study will be pursued on the Life of Christ, the particular topic for next Sunday being "Christ's Nativity." All men are invited to be present.

THE METHODIST SCHOOL CASE.—This case has been set down for hearing at the coming term of the Court of Chancery, which opens here on Tuesday, 30th of May, inst. The action which will be tried before Vice-Chancellor Henley is one instituted by the subscribers of the old Methodist School to have the money realized by the sale of the School property divided amongst them, and the case will no doubt be interesting to all parties.

A CURIOUSITY.—M. & B. McRae, of Pownal, found in a lobster trap the other day a small lobster, which was a voluntary prisoner in a large whelk shell. The mollusc must have fallen into the habitation of the whelk when he was a little fellow, and being unable to get out at once, evidently grew until there was no possibility of escape. The lobster was able to crawl about quite lively, but died a day or two after being captured.

THE RIFLE.—The third of the series of inter-annual range practices came off at Kensington yesterday afternoon. The weather was unfavorable for good shooting. There were ten competitors. The eight best scores follow: Sergeant J. M. Davison, 86 points; Captain Weeks, 83; Staff-Sergt Allen, 81; Corp. J. A. McDonald, 80; Captain Crockett, 80; Sergt. Longworth, 76; Major Longworth, 75; Lieut. Stewart, 75. The next and second last practice will be held on Saturday afternoon.

THE FASTNET.—The steamer Fastnet arrived here from Halifax with a general cargo, at 10 o'clock last night. She left at 12 o'clock for Summerside, whence she will sail direct on return for Halifax. After this date the steamer will return to Charlottetown from her Summerside trip, thus affording a pleasant excursion between the two places. On next Wednesday the Queen's Birthday, the Fastnet will leave early in the forenoon for Summerside, returning to town early on Thursday morning. Return tickets for this trip will be issued at one dollar.

THE HABEAS CORPUS CASE.—Charles Slate's application for discharge from Queen's County Jail was heard at Chambers yesterday afternoon before Judge Hodgson. The Attorney-General and Mr. Fitzgerald opposed Slate's discharge, and Mr. Stewart argued in favor of it. We understand quite a number of objections were taken to the proceedings. Mr. Justice Hodgson reserved judgment until tomorrow morning. In the meantime Slate was remanded to jail.

Theatrical.

THERE was a good audience in attendance at the Lyceum last evening, to witness the presentation of "Shun Rhue" by the John S. Murphy Company. As on the previous evening, the performance was greatly enjoyed. The story told in "Shun Rhue" is the old one of poverty and virtue against wealth and villainy, with the former triumphant at the last. Like its companion-drama, the "Kerry Gow," it is brimful of good clean wit and brilliant repartee, which never fails to please. Last night Mr. Murphy, in the dual characters of "Larry Donovan" and "Shun Rhue," was excellent, leaving nothing to be desired. In the second act, when alone by his mother's grave in the churchyard, Larry sang with much feeling the well-known and ever popular Irish ballad, "A Handful of Earth." The leading lady, Miss Carolyn Elberta, gave a splendid representation of "Kate Donovan." Mr. Sheehan as "Lawyer Waddy" was exceedingly amusing; and Messrs. Hutchinson and Kilday as "Bryan Callaghan" and "Peter Callaghan"—the villains of the play—were very realistic in their acting. The parts of "Gerald Cavanagh" and "Patrick Cavanagh" were cleverly taken by Messrs. Thompson and Scott; and Miss Ella Baker as "Tim" was decidedly good. The other characters were also well impersonated. The company is certainly one of the best we have seen in Charlottetown for some considerable time. To-night the "Kerry Gow" will be repeated for the benefit of those unable to secure seats on Tuesday night. It is a splendid play—replete with exciting scenes and humorous situations. All who can should attend.
