Local and Other Items.

JOURNALIST MADE HAPPY.—We were presented this week with a generous supply of turnips raised on the farm of Mr H E Duff, at Petit de Grat. Mr Duff has good reason to feel proud of their size and excellent quality. —Amherst Record.

ENCOURAGING ENTERPRISE.—Woolstock, N. B. is a live town. The Board of Trade of that place is making enquiries in regard to the establishment of a pulp mill, and Mavor Hay has promised that the town will vote \$10,000 towards the enterprise.

NEW WAR VESSELS.—Fifty-five new war vessels are now building for the United States Government. Of these 8 are first-class heavy armored sea-going battleships; 38 are torpedo boats; 4 are monitors; and 1 is a powerful cruiser. When they are completed, the United States will take rank as the third naval power of the world.

ARRESTED IN TORONTO.—Sigmund Schlessinger, formerly a merchant of Chicago, but for some time past the occupant of a handsome house on Dunbar Road, a fashionable section of Toronto, has been arrested on a Chicago warrant, charging him with having received stolen goods to the value of \$2300. The offence is said to have occurred in 1896. The prisoner will fight extradition.

TYPHOID FEVER.—There is a good deal of typhoid fever in and about Charlottetown at the present time, attributable, more or less, to the wet weather which has prevailed for some time past. There are five cases of the disease in the Charlottetown Hospital, including three McCarthy children whose home is in the vicinity of the rail way premises.

A LONG JOURNEY.—It is not often that three young children undertake a journey of several thousand miles alone. Yet the Atlantic Express on Saturday brought three little tots that had come all the way from the city of Houston, Texas, utterly alone and they were not checked as baggage either. The children are bound to Halifax to visit their grand-parents, their parents being former provincialists. Their names are Frank Quinn, John Felix Quinn, and Grace Quinn, and they are particularly bright children. To a reporter the eldest said that they had enjoyed the trip immensely and had not been sick.—St. John Gazette.

P. E. ISLAND HOSPITAL.—Miss Isabel Macmillan made the first payment, \$84 yesterday on her contribution of \$250 to the ward for crippled children in the new hospital. Miss Macmillan has shown a praiseworthy interest in the matter and her efforts have awakened a general cordial sympathy for its advancement. Her recital last winter in aid of the ward was such a complete success that she has decided to give another at an early date for the same object. Miss Macmillan may feel assured of a generous response as Charlottetown people are not slow to recognize unselfish devotion to a worthy cause.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.—A sister of Theodore Lvoierre, a clerk at the British American Hotel, was shot in the face at Chezz-took on Monday last by a discharge from a gun supposed to be fired by one of a party from Halifax, consisting of a young man and an officer. Several shot also pierced her hands and arms, and some entered just below the eye. She dropped unconscious. Physicians have removed most of the shot, but the girl, being weak physically, is in a precarious condition. It is said the parties were warned not to fire in the direction where the accident took place as there were people around there. The father has been in town about the matter.—Halifax Recorder.

THEIR KISMET

Proverbs, like grammatical rules, are liable to exceptions. For instance, the familiar saying, "Lightning does not strike twice in the same place," had its exception during the bombardment of Widin by the Russian batteries of Kalafat on the opposite shore of the Danube. The incident is described by Dr. Ryan in his book, "Under the Red Crescent," the Turkish equivalent for the Red Cross society.

The shells from the heavy siege guns at Kalafat were dropping incessantly within the fortress. One of them as it exploded tore a great hole in the ground large enough to contain a horse. A Turkish woman, who was cowering with her three children under the shadow of the wall, took refuge in the hole.

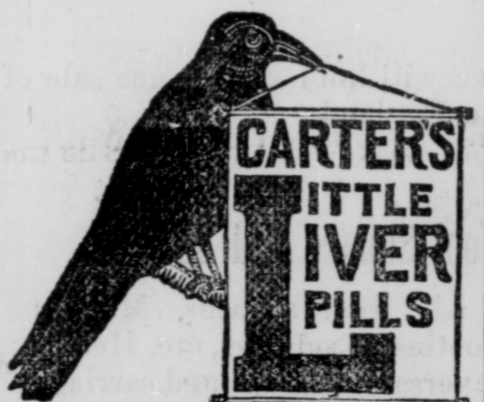
According to the law of chances, it was the least likely spot to be again hit by a shell. But scarcely had she crept in and drawn the three children after her when another shell, leaving the cannon's mouth at Kalafat, nearly two miles away, dropped into the same hole and blew mother and children to atoms. To the Turks the grim exception was a vivid illustration of their doctrine of kismet, or fate. The woman's hour had come; kismet led her into that hole; it was the place assigned for her departure from earth.

Another shell struck the angle of a house, tore down the walls and reduced one half of a room to ruins. In the other half of the room were a Turkish woman and two children. They were not even hurt. Their kismet, according to Turkish ideas, saved them.

NEWS NOTES.

Great Britain imports nearly \$45,000,000 of wheat flour, but Canada only supplies about \$800,000, a mere "flea in the tar barrel."
