In the third heat "Western Belle's" driver claimed a foul and demanded the heat. The judges refused to give it, whereupon "Western Belle" was drawn from the race and "Tidy" walked the course alone on the fourth heat.

THE MOWATT GOVERNMENT.—The Hamilton Spectator, a journal which weighs carefully its utterances, says: "The fate of the Mowatt Government is now trembling in the balance. The Government to-day cannot certainly count a majority of more than five or six, while one or two of the members making up that majority are doubtful. Several constituencies will be reopened by protests, and it is quite on the cards that the Government may open the session without a majority at all."

RATHER a remarkable new departure, now being made in Montreal, is thus referred to by the Journal of Commerce: Two of the larger manufacturers in the city, Messrs J. W. Mackenzie & Co., in clothing, and Messrs. Ames, Holden & Co., in boots and shoes, have chartered a train from this city to Manitoba, each firm taking so many cars, the whole to be in charge of a competent employee of the firm. Other firms will probably follow their example in this respect as affording the readiest means of supplying customers' orders in Manitoba and the North-west.

LORD LORNE ON SKATES.—On the 3rd inst., a large Tobogganing Party came off at Rideau Hall. Bonfires, Chinese Lanterns, Rockets, Roman Candles, etc., lighted up a most brilliant scene. The Ottawa Snow-shoe Club, in their blanket costumes of bright colors, looked well. There were three slides for Tobogganers which were constantly occupied. The Governor-General commenced the amusements of the evening by dancing a set of Lancers, on skates, with Mrs. J. E. Boyd as partner. The whole set being dressed in brilliant toggyery. Lord Lorne is a most graceful skater, and at the conclusion of the dance upon skates, was warmly applauded by the immense crowd present.

The Public Temperance Meeting held last evening at New Glasgow Road was well attended. The chair was filled by W. J. Suman, Esq., who opened the meeting with a short and appropriate address. He was followed by Messrs. Chappell, Godfrey, Henderson, Westcott, Power and Boudry. The addresses were interspersed with singing and recitations, altogether forming a very interesting and profitable meeting. At the close of the public meeting, "Northern Light" Division was opened in due form by the W. Patriarch, James Seaman, Esq. After the election of officers, and the transaction of other business, it adjourned to meet again on April 2nd. It is the intention of this Division to resume weekly meetings.

SILVER Spring, in Georgia, is said to be the largest spring in the world. It is the source of the Oklawaha River, which is sixty feet wide at the start, ten feet deep, and with a current flowing two miles an hour. All this vast quantity of water comes from the spring, whose only inlets are at the bottom. It is about six acres in size, and its mysterious depths have never been explored. There is an Indian legend about Silver Spring of course. Wenonah, the beauty of the tribe that inhabited the neighborhood, won the love of Chullootab, a hostile chief. Her wrathful father slew the lover, and then Wenonah drowned herself in the spring, which was then small, but was instantly enlarged to its present proportions by the Great Spirit's abundant tears of sympathy.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The Orange Bill.

OTTAWA, March 20.

Mr. John White, East Hastings, in the Commons yesterday introduced a bill to incorporate the Loyal Orange Association of the Dominion of Canada.

It was read a first time.

Mr. White moved that it be read a second time to-morrow.

Mr. Coursol moved that the bill be read a second time this day six months.

Mr. Burns seconded the motion.

Messrs. Wallace, Cameron, Bowell and others, favored the second reading of the bill.

Mr. Curran strongly objected to the second reading.

The motion for second reading was carried, eighty-nine to ninety-four.

A bill incorporating the Royal Society of Canada, was read a second time yesterday.

After a number of private bills were read, and numerous questions were answered, the House adjourned.

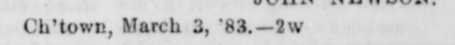
