House of Assembly.

AFTERNOON SESSION. APRIL 19.

After some further time in committee the bill to incorporate the Farmers' and Dairy-men's Association was reported agreed to without amendment.

The House then went into Committee of Supply. Mr. Bentley censured the Government for their conduct towards the late Edward Henry; showed that the amount of his account should have been paid last year, and that Mr. Henry should not have been put to the annoyance and wrong, and loss which resulted in his death.

Hon. Mr. McLean contended that Mr. Henry was not ill-treated and that the Government was not responsible for his death. If Mr. Henry came to town and took look the Government could not help it.

Hon. Mr. McLeod pointed out that the contract was let to Mr. Henry by the late Hon. Hugh L. McDonald. He contended that if Mr. Sinclair contended, the work was not properly done, the Government should have fallen back upon the securities.

On the item appropriating the salaries and expenses of the Public Works officials, Mr. McKay expressed the hope that the Leader of the Government would hold the Commissioner to the estimates.

Hon. Mr. Peters read a letter from the Secretary of Public Works, setting forth that the travelling expenses included here hire in connection with the department.

Mr. Bentley said that he invariably paid his own horse hire out of the amount voted as travelling expenses while he was Commissioner of Public Works, and always kept it within \$300 for the year.

Mr. Warburton asked the Commissioner of Public Works if any petition or petitions had been received for the opening of a new road or roads from Riverdale to the Currie Road on Lot 30, or from Riverdale to the Appin Road.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the matter was under the consideration of the Government. Mr. Warburton asked if any petition had been received for the opening of a road from Fredericton Railway Station to Millvale, near McMillan's Mills, and what action was proposed to be taken in the matter.

The Commissioner of Public Works answered that he had received such petition and understood the proposed road to be a very important one. He had intended personally visiting the locality and seeing the route proposed for this and other roads asked for, before the session opened, but was prevented by illness from doing so.

Mr. Warburton also asked if a petition was received last year from residents of Lot 29, asking for the opening of a short piece of road across Mrs. Hall's farm, and if the petitioners had subscribed any funds towards defraying the cost of said road, and what action was proposed to be taken in the matter.

The Commissioner of Public Works said such petition had been received and was under consideration.

The bill to incorporate the Farmers' and Dairy-men's Association of P. E. Island was read a third time and passed.

The Leader of the Opposition presented a bill to amend the Waterworks Act. Read a first time.

Mr. Clow asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government to open a new road from Floating Bridge to Murray River during the present summer, as petitioned for by the inhabitants of Lots 63 and 64; also, if it is the intention of the Government to take any action on a petition from the inhabitants of Lot 64, praying for the opening of a new road from Murray River School-house to Bull's road, between the farms of James Dunn and John Lowe, at that place; also, if it is the intention of the Government to increase the wharf accommodation at Murray River, Lot 63, during this present session as petitioned for by the inhabitants of that section, Lot 63 and 64 and surrounding districts.

Hon. Mr. McLean replied that each of these matters would be investigated and considered.

The bill to amend the act incorporating the trustees of the Presbyterial Church at Montague was read a second time, committed, and reported agreed to without amendment.

The bill to incorporate the New London Hall Company was read a second time, committed, and reported agreed to.

The bill to incorporate the Park Corner Hall Company was read a second time, committed, and reported agreed to.

The bill to provide instruction in the public schools concerning the effects of stimulants and narcotics on the human system was further considered in committee. Progress reported.
