STEAMER WRECKED.

Heavy Loss of Life.

LISBON, Oct. 29. The British steamship Romania has been wrecked at the mouth of the Areiko River, near Poniche, and 118 persons have been drowned. She is an iron screw steamer of 3387 tons, belonging to the Anchor Line and plying between Liverpool and Bombay.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Oct. 29. His Excellency the Governor-Governor has decided that the sentence of death passed upon Olsen, alias Buck, cannot be interfered with. Although the verdict contained a recommendation to mercy, there appeared no facts in evidence to warrant a commutation of the death sentence.

Hon. Mr. Tupper will leave for England on Monday. The Canadian representative to the conference with Newfoundland delegates will leave for Halifax on Thursday.

The election for East Assinboia has been fixed for Nov. 23rd. In an interview regarding the position of the Government on the Manitoba School Question Sir John Thompson said the subject has not been taken up and will not be until the pending appeal is heard by the privy council.

A Big Blaze.

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 29. A fire which started in the Union Oil Company store threatened to destroy the entire wholesale business section of Milwaukee east of Milwaukee River, below Huron Street. But it was got under control at 11 45 last night. Insurances men estimate that the entire loss will aggregate \$7,000,000.

Exportation of Eggs.

MONTREAL, Oct. 29. The exportation of eggs to Great Britain has assumed large proportions. In two weeks the Beaver Line has shipped 20 carloads containing 214,000 dozen eggs to Liverpool.

General Telegraphic News.

TORONTO, Oct. 27.—The News has declared a lock-out against its competitors. The introduction of type-setting machines caused the trouble.

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—Arrangements have been made whereby the Crofters immigrants settling in British Columbia will receive titles to their property directly from the provincial government, and not through the colonization company who are promoting the enterprise.

HALIFAX, Oct. 27.—Two boys, aged 18 and 20 years, named Almon and Domville, have confessed that they were the attempted wreckers of the Sydney train. They say they earned a dollar, went to Leitch's Creek to "blow themselves," and while under the influence of the liquor committed the crime.

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—Unofficial returns of Canadian trade for the first quarter of the present fiscal year, compared with the same period last year, show an increase of exports of five and three quarters millions, and duty one half million. It will be noticed that the export trade last year was 16 per cent. over the previous year, and that the first quarter of this year shows the same per centage of increase over last year.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 27.—Since the outbreak of the cholera in the Russian dominions there have been in the lieutenantcy of the Caucasus 12,000 cases of the disease and 65,000 deaths. In Saratoff there have been 31,000 cases, 11,000 deaths; and in St. Petersburg 3,300 cases and 1,150 deaths, making in these three districts alone a total of 159,300 cases and 77,000 deaths. Three weeks ago the disease broke out in Warsaw and since that time 200 deaths have occurred in that city.

EL PASO, TEXAS, Oct. 27.—News has been received here of the total annihilation of the town of Tomochie, in Western Chihuahua, Mexico. The town has been in open rebellion against the federal government for some time on account of excessive taxation, extortion by federal officials and government interference with the people's religious practices. Two months ago a battalion sent to subdue the unruly Tomochies was repulsed by the latter and forced to retreat. Two weeks ago the government sent 1,800 men to Tomochie and on Monday they made an attack upon the town. The slaughter was terrible. The soldiers lost 368 of their number and many were wounded. Not a man of the Tomochie was left, except those who happened to be out in the mountains. The village next day presented a frightful appearance. The streets were filled with dead bodies and blood seemed to have flowed in torrents.

BOSTON, Oct. 27.—An important clause in Mr. Blake's speech delivered in Tremont Temple last night was this: "We are not likely to obtain home rule as a completed measure next session or this session of parliament. The Irish party has before it a struggle as critical and difficult as it has had. It has to contend before it which it is not merely propounding the principles and forcing the attention of the English people to the necessity of redress, but it has to do with a constructive part of legislation."

MADRID, Oct. 27.—At the Geographical Congress Tuesday, Senor Reparaz urged Spain and Portugal and the South American States to establish efficient steamship service between their home ports and their colonies, in order to cement the existing cordial relations.

CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—East-bound grain shipments are taxing the railways to their utmost capacity, and the lakes and railway lines are still embarrassed. Advice from New York state that the storage capacity in that city is nearly filled, with a slight export demand to relieve the glut. The blockade has gradually increased until it has reached the transshipping points on Lake Erie. The Anchor Line of steamers has given notice that it will receive no more grain at Erie for the present. At Buffalo the railways and Erie boatmen are running a race in advancing their rates to New York. The Erie transportation companies controlled by the trunk lines are only taking enough grain to fill out the cargoes of their own steamers. The wild boats are no longer cared for, and their agents find it extremely difficult to charter them at all.
