Continued from page 1 owner occupancy will be paid by the home owner.

—Down payments will be cut to 10 per cent from 20 on the first \$8,000 of the house lending value, but increased to 30 per cent on the remaining portions up to a unspecified maximum. The cost of a mortgage will be booked to 25 years from 20.

—Mr. Winters said the mortgage ceiling and interest rates will be fixed by the cabinet later. But he said the impact will be that on a house with a lending value of \$16,000, the ratio of loan to lending value will be "greater than 80 per cent, with corresponding lesser amounts of equity or down payment requirements."

—Experts outside the Commons said that on that basis, a builder could get a maximum loan of perhaps \$12,800, making the down payment about \$3,200 on a \$16,000 house. Currently the down payment is \$6,000.

Costs Rising

—Mr. Winters also said that building costs have risen about 25 per cent since the \$10,000 ceiling was established. That must be taken into consideration, in setting the new limit.

—As for interest rates, he said that a five-per-cent rate would be too low to attract mortgage money, but that a six-per-cent charge would be excessive in view of the insurance guarantees.

—The government currently subsidizes rates on joint loans with mortgage lenders. CMHC agrees to take 3 per cent on its portion of the loan, allowing the commercial borrowers to take 5 per cent. That makes the rate for the mortgage 5 per cent.

—Mr. Winters said that rates showed an upward movement during 1953, but promised to give consideration to "all factors" involved in setting the new toll.

—Critics of the government's move, he said, have suggested that mortgage lending was the reason for banking troubles in the United States in the 1930s.

—But in that case the trouble resulted from industrial and commercial, rather than residential mortgages.

Good For Loans

—The banks will be able to lend only on residential housing. They will be able to remain "liquid" by selling the mortgages on the market. CMHC will be authorized to buy the mortgages from lenders and in addition the banks will be able to use this financial paper to obtain loans from the Bank of Canada.

—Under the insurance arrangement, CMHC will take over defaulted mortgages, paying the mortgage holder in cash: 1. 98 per cent of the outstanding principal and, if owing up to six months of interest at the full rate.

—On additional outstanding interest—up to a maximum of 12 months—CMHC will pay the mort-

—race rate, less two per cent. 2. CMHC will pay for such borrower's charges as fire insurance and taxes advanced by the lender; acquisition fee of \$125, and other approved taxable legal disbursements.

—As the new system gets into operation, CMHC will gradually withdraw from the joint lending schemes under which it combines with such organizations as life insurance companies to make FHA loans.

—But it will still remain in part of the lending field. It still will provide loans for alum clearance, low-cost and subsidized rental projects and loans to primary producers, such as farmers, lumbermen and fishermen.

—"Every effort must be put forward to ensure that the new arrangements are in operation by early in the spring of this year," Mr. Winters said.

—"The present situation is that the lending institutions are applying such an unusually large proportion of their new money to mortgage investment, that a decline in mortgage money from this source must be anticipated.

—"And even now their heavy mortgage investment is being supplemented by Central Mortgage which, in addition to its share of joint loans, is making direct loans at the rate of about 60,000,000 a year."

ELIZABETH TAYLOR IN ROMANTIC DRAMA CAPITOL, SUMMERSIDE

—Elizabeth Taylor, who proved herself a consummate dramatic actress in "A Place in the Sun" and the more recent "Ivanhoe", now tops both these earlier performances with her dynamic role in M-G-M's "The Girl Who Had Everything", in which she co-stars on the Capitol screen with Fernando Lamas and William Powell.

—In this emotionally taut romantic drama she is seen as Jean, the beautiful and spirited daughter of the famous criminal lawyer, Steve Latimer (William Powell), who has brought her up to believe that she can do whatever she wishes as long as she is willing to pay the cost. This liberal and modern code backfires on the father when Jean becomes infatuated with Victor Ramondi (Fernando Lamas), a notorious racketeer with a tough and disreputable past.
