Toronto Police Seeking Killer

TORONTO (CP)—Police Chief James Mackey Tuesday took personal direction of the hunt for the slayer of a pretty 12-year-old girl lured from her home on the pretence of a baby-sitting job. Police were searching the Toronto area for a late-model car the girl was seen getting into by David Keith, 10-year-old school-boy. Rewards totalling \$6,500 for information leading to the arrest of her slayer were posted. At large was the man who telephoned Pat Lupton Monday night, after choosing her name from a supermarket bulletin board list, and offered her a baby-sitting job. The girl arranged to meet the stranger at the suburban Scarborough supermarket. She told her mother, Mrs. Albert Lupton, she would phone from the man's home. She never spoke to her mother again.

Two hours later the girl's body was found in a snow-covered field. Her scarf was knotted tightly around her throat. Police put forward this theory on the strangling. Having picked up the girl, the man attempted to force her to submit to an indecent proposal. He strangled her when she threatened to report him to police. **SPINSTER SLAIN** The slaying was one of two Monday night in the Toronto area. The other victim was an 81-year-old spinster, described by neighbors as "sweet and gentle." Police said Ila Jean Dean died in hospital after being tortured and stabbed numerous times with an icepick in her old Victorian-styled end-home. An autopsy showed thrusts of the pick, deep enough to pierce a vital organ, had entered her heart and brain. Police believe robbery was the motive.

(Continued from page 1) The Premier recalled that he had expressed himself as being fond of cats at the time the bill was before the House. He said that as the result of a picture of a beautiful cat appearing in the Patriot many people have become alarmed about the legislation. Frank Myers: "I wasn't asleep and I knew what I was voting on." The Premier's motion was the signal to start the debate all over again and before a vote was finally taken on an amendment to the act by Harvey Douglas (L-2nd Kings), nine more members got into the discussion. Mr. Douglas' motion which was defeated stated, "that no one without the consent of the owner shall kill a cat whether it be on the property of the owner or elsewhere." The whole matter was settled by striking out the clause entirely.

NOT ASLEEP

Dr. Bonnell in referring to the Premier's remarks said he was not a cat murderer, neither was he asleep when the section was passed. He said he had important business elsewhere and was not in the House. He thought the act would give any trigger happy hunter the opportunity to shoot cats whether they be on their own property or not. Fred Ramsay (L-1st Prince) said he was happy to endorse Dr. Bonnell's remarks. S. S. Hessian (L-5th Kings) said he remembered everything that had been said in the Friday debate. He recalled that the Premier said he liked cats. "Cats have been with us a long time and children will be playing with them a long time after we are gone," he said.

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Bomarc Report Is Given House

OTTAWA (CP)—Defence Minister Pearkes said Tuesday in the Commons that there will be two Bomarc anti-aircraft missile squadrons in Canada. But he did not give—and was not asked for—the missile strength of each of these squadrons. Mr. Pearkes was replying to Opposition Leader Pearson who asked for an explanation of the apparent contradictory statements by the minister and Air Marshal Hugh Campbell, chief of air staff. Art Smith (PC—Calgary South) said in the Commons March 3 that Air Marshal Campbell had made a speech at Montebello, Que., Feb. 5 and quoted him as saying that the RCAF had been given the green light for two Bomarc "half-squadrons." Mr. Pearkes said Tuesday in reply to C. W. Carter (L—Burlington) that Air Marshal Campbell did not give a speech at Montebello, Que., on that date.
