Final Prince County Survey Recommends Modernization

Small farms typical in Prince County will not provide adequate income for the farm family to enjoy the standard of living common to most Canadians, the report of the firm of Arthur D. Little of Canada Limited states. The provincial government has received the final report of the consulting firm, which investigated agriculture, fisheries and tourism potential in Prince County.

Development Opportunities Seen For Fishing Industry

A summary view of Prince County's fishing industry suggests development opportunities, but there is a need for current market research to find the most profitable opportunities. The report suggests that development opportunities in the under-utilized abundant supply of ground and surface fish in nearby fishing grounds. It stated there is a promising opportunity for the expansion of oyster farming.

Transportation problems and air pollution have again become topics of discussion at the monthly board of trade meeting here last night. Considerable concern was shown in regards to the air transportation problem which the commercial airway servicing the province is into following the recent mild spell. For five days the local airport was with commercial traffic due to planes being unable to land when the runways were unable to take the weight of the heavy planes.

Program For Development Of Industries Is Given

In the Arthur D. Little report to the department of agriculture a section on an industrial development program for P.E.I. listed three types of programs that might be considered. One was the establishment of a Prince Edward Island Development Fund. The fund would provide loans to existing industry and businessmen to cover the costs of agricultural research needed to evaluate the feasibility of a proposed venture from a marketing and production standpoint.

Feasibility Of Flax Here In Need Of Further Study

In the recent 67-page report of the economic development opportunities in Prince County, 10 of those pages were devoted to flax and it was concluded that considerable additional study must be made to determine the feasibility of flax production. "Until the results of this study are known, commercial flax production would not be justified," said the Arthur D. Little Co., authors of the report.

Second Nat. Park Urged; Tourist Incentives Given

The report of the P.E.I. generally favorable for flax production, but the high average rainfall in the latter part of the summer appears likely to aggravate the problem of drying the straw. Much of the section of the report devoted to flax outlined the many growth and processing problems that would be encountered in the establishment of a flax industry.
