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SCENE AT WAR MONUMENT UNVEILING, 1925

Pictured above are members of the armed services, government and civic officials, members of the clergy and citizens generally who took part in or witnessed the unveiling of the Soldier's Monument in Queen Square on July 16th, 1925. Taking part in the memorable and impressive ceremony were the late Hon. Frank R. Heartz, Lieutenant Governor, the late Hon. James D. Stewart, Premier of the Province, and the late John McKenna, Mayor of Charlottetown. In his report to the City Council His Worship Mayor McKenna said: "The Soldiers' Monument was completed during the year, and the unveiling which took place on the 16th. of July was elaborately and satisfactorily carried out. This monument was erected by the citizens of Charlottetown to the memory of all from the Province who gave their services in the day of our Country's need". The cost of the monument according to the City records was approximately \$10,500.


Council Discusses Heating Problem In Market Building

The City Council, with His Worship Mayor J. D. Stewart presiding, and Councillors MacDonald, Gaudet, McCormac, Hutcheson and Wright present held an emergency council meeting yesterday afternoon at City Hall. Its purpose was to discuss the causes and remedies regarding the unsatisfactory operation of heating plant in the City Market Building and to pass on various tenders. With regard to the heating plant it was pointed out that at the present time the boiler is consuming approximately one thousand gallons of fuel oil a week. Considering the lack of sufficient heat in several parts of the building this consumption is considered far too high. Mr. Heber Jones of Douglas Bros. and Jones pointed out that efficient operation could not be expected from the boiler when it was feeding two different types of radiator systems. The new system is fitted with traps on the radiators, while the old system is not. Through this lack of proper fittings on the old system the boiler was being caused to operate continually, instead of cutting out when the required room temperature was reached. It was also pointed out by Mr. L. Llewellyn, Building Supervisor, in the old system a number of the pipes were in a leaking condition due to erosion, and should be replaced. Mr. Jones was invited to inform the Council as to what would be required to put the heating plant back into an efficiently operating condition. The Council also decided to defer any work on the system until such time as the steel beams under the floor have been renewed.

HEATED DISCUSSION — A spirited discussion took place with regard to the responsibilities of Market and Public Property Committees. His Worship informed Councillor Hutcheson that any structural work was the responsibility of Public Property Committee. He criticized the Councillor for making expenditures at Market Committee chairman out which were out of his jurisdiction. In the heat of the moment Councillor Hutcheson threatened to resign. The remainder of the Councillors prevailed upon him to take time to reconsider, which he apparently accepted and the meeting continued in an amiable atmosphere. Other business discussed was the awarding of the following contracts: County Construction Co. Ltd. for the replacement of the steel framing under the City Fish Market floor at a cost of \$1,365. British American Oil Co. Ltd. to supply the City with fuel oil for the Civic Centre. L. G. Gillespie for supplying the City with fourteen pairs rubber boots for the Fire Department. H. R. Large and Co., for supplying the City with one hundred and fifty tons Springhill coal for City Building.

To Compete For Scholarship

Thomas Joseph Dupuy, Peakes Station, has been selected by an agricultural committee to compete in the T. Eaton Company agricultural scholarships at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto. The scholarship is awarded each year and the winner thereof is entitled to attend a four year agricultural course at the University of his own choice. Mr. Dupuy left yesterday afternoon for Toronto where he will compete with representatives of the other provinces at the Fair. Mr. Dupuy was born at Peakes on December 12, 1937. His early education was taken at Peakes Station Public School where he attended from grade 1 to grade VIII. He then attended St. Teresa School, where he took grades IX and X course, and was successful in passing his matriculation examinations on the completion of his grade X course. For the past two years, he has attended St. Dunstan's College at Charlottetown where he was successful in obtaining his Junior Matriculation Certificate, and is in attendance at this College, working towards his Senior Matriculation, without which he would be unable to enter the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph where he plans to continue his agricultural education. For the past four years, Mr. Dupuy has been a member of the Baldwin's Road 4-H Poultry Club, and during that time has shown a keen interest in the activities of his own club, and in 4-H Club work in general. Consumers Association Meeting In City Hall

The Canadian Association of Consumers held its first meeting of the season at the Y. M. C. A. yesterday afternoon. The Provincial President, Mrs. J. A. Lawson presided and reported on the work accomplished by the Association and projects and consumer problems were freely discussed. A number of amendments to the National Constitution and by-laws were ratified and a resolution was ordered sent from the meeting to the Provincial Department of Agriculture asking that they look into the matter of standardizing the weight of the packages of ripe tomatoes being imported to this Province. Mrs. Lawson said that at present a great variety of packages are in the stores and what the consumer is a keen shopper and takes time to examine the weight on the carton what is advertised as a special bargain may be no bargain at all. A standard carton of say 12 or 14 ozs. or perhaps an option of either would be a protection to the customer and a boon to the distributor. The C. A. C. has been asked by the Tea Council of Canada to assume and conduct a tea survey in Canada. The Council is seeking in respect to the use of tea in the home. The members present voted to take on this project and Mrs. Allison MacMillan of Fairville offered to take charge of distributing tea to rural housewives who will keep a check on the number of cups of tea obtained from the tea used. Mrs. Lawson will distribute the tea to urban members. A recording of an interview with Mrs. Vautelet, the National President with Mrs. Geo. Keefe of Station CJAD Montreal was played and the members were thrilled with her enthusiastic report on the workings of the Association, what has been accomplished in the past year and what projects are being launched. Mrs. Vautelet is a very gifted speaker and the interview was most entertaining.
