Creamery Butter Stocks Decline

OTTAWA (CP) — Creamery butter stocks in nine Canadian cities April 1 declined sharply to 27,400,000 pounds from 45,863,000 on the corresponding date last year, the bureau of statistics said Wednesday.

The bureau said cheddar cheese stocks declined to 13,812,000 pounds from 13,990,000 and cold storage eggs rose to 140,000 cases from 54,000 on April 1, 1956.

Sudden Death Of L. W. Simms

SAINT JOHN, N. B. (CP)—A heart attack early Wednesday ended the long industrial career of L. W. Simms of adjoining Lunenburg, for many years a strong proponent of Maritime rights organizations.

The 72-year-old president of T. S. Simms and Co. Ltd., which is the largest brush manufacturing firm in the British Commonwealth, was a widely-known figure in the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council, the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade and the Maritimes Transportation Commission.

Mr. Simms' life revolved about the company of which he became president in 1924 upon the death of his father. He joined the firm in 1902 and during the following six years worked his way up through company ranks.

His father, Thomas W. Simms, was born in Maine. Following service in the United States civil war, Mr. Simms bought into a broom company in 1872 and moved the company here after acquiring sole ownership.

Mr. Simms is survived by his widow, a daughter and a son. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

The fate of the port shifts with the winds, said a shipping official of Bowater's Newfoundland Pulp and Paper Mills Ltd.

Airman Sucked Into Jet Engine

MONTREAL (CP)—An RCAF airman Wednesday was critically injured when sucked into the intake of a jet fighter plane while its engine was being run up at nearby St. Hubert air base.

An RCAF spokesman said leading airframe fitter John Doherty, 29, a native of New Glasgow, Scotland, had assisted in the starting up of the engine.

"Then he walked too close to the nose and was swept into the intake," said the spokesman.

Doherty suffered serious head injuries, lacerations and a dislocated shoulder.
