40 Persons Injured In Beale Fan Riot

MELBOURNE (Reuters) — Forty persons were taken to hospitals following a riot here Sunday when an estimated 20,000 turned out to welcome Britain's pop-singing Beatles. All 40 were released after treatment. Another 100 persons were given first aid for fainting, hysteria and minor injuries suffered in mob scenes outside the Beatles hotel.

At one point, police had to force horses through the crowd to rescue collapsed teen-agers, children and elderly people. They brought them out slung over the horses' necks.

Earlier, at the airport, about 1,000 teen-agers—some of whom had waited there 18 hours—screamed, shouted and waved banners as John Lennon, Paul McCartney and George Harris flew in from Adelaide with stand-in drummer Jimmy Nicol.

The group's regular drummer, Ringo Starr, who missed their first two Australian concerts because of illness, arrived here earlier from London to a screaming welcome from 2,000 fans.

ARREST YOUTH

A 20-year-old youth who jumped a barricade at the airport when Ringo arrived was arrested and charged with trespassing, using indecent language and resisting arrest, a police officer said.

A girl burst a blood vessel in her throat while screaming and went into a hysterical faint.

As the three Beatles drove into Melbourne, crowds lined the roads and in the city police struggled to control tens of thousands of teen-agers. Girls pined and were trampled on. Mounted police eventually cleared a narrow space through the crowd for the Beatles to pass. Teen-agers wedged 90 to 100 deep broke into a deafening cry of "We want the Beatles" as police cars crawled slowly to the hotel.

After a half-hour appearance, Lennon told a hotel press conference the Beatles did nothing calculated to cause near-hysteria among fans.

There were always small groups who screamed and "if the rest of the crowd likes it, they scream too," he said.

One fisherman said yesterday that this has been his poorest season in 10 years but did add that some fishermen were more fortunate than he and did catch a few lobsters.
