## City Plans Bid For Marine Slip

"They have done absolutely nothing for Queen's County," said Mayor Walter J. Cox yesterday as he announced an all-out effort to bring the new proposed marine slip to the city instead of Georgetown. Mr. Cox referred to the work of governments who have done everything to improve conditions in Kings County but little interest has been paid to Queen's County.

"An industrial revolution is our only hope for survival," he said as the plan was announced. The mayor insisted all organizations and citizens should get behind the idea of getting the marine slip for the capital city of the province.

"We are not asking for hand-outs, the way others are; but our only hope of industrial survival is to fight to have some of these things established in Charlottetown then we will work out our own salvation," the Mayor stated.

## Fine Imposed For Unlawful Liquor Sale

40 Expected To Attend Fish Course

Hon. Leo F. Rossiter, provincial minister of fisheries and W.A. Murphy, officer in charge of the Federal Fish Laboratory, will open the fourth biennial canning course for plant managers and foremen. Over 40 men are expected to participate in the four-day course beginning next Tuesday in the Dominion Building.

The department of fisheries will sponsor the course, and guest speaker is Dr. D.G. McLeese, biologist from the Atlantic Fisheries Biological station at St. Andrews, N.B. Dr. McLeese will speak on "Handling and holding of live lobsters." Other speakers include Dr. C.M. Blackwood, D.H. Cullen, Public Health Service, D.C. Champion, and R.J. MacNeil.

C.H. Castell, one of the foremost authorities on marine microbiology, will also speak at the four-day course, and he will stress the importance of sterilization procedures.

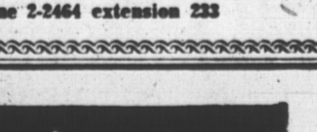

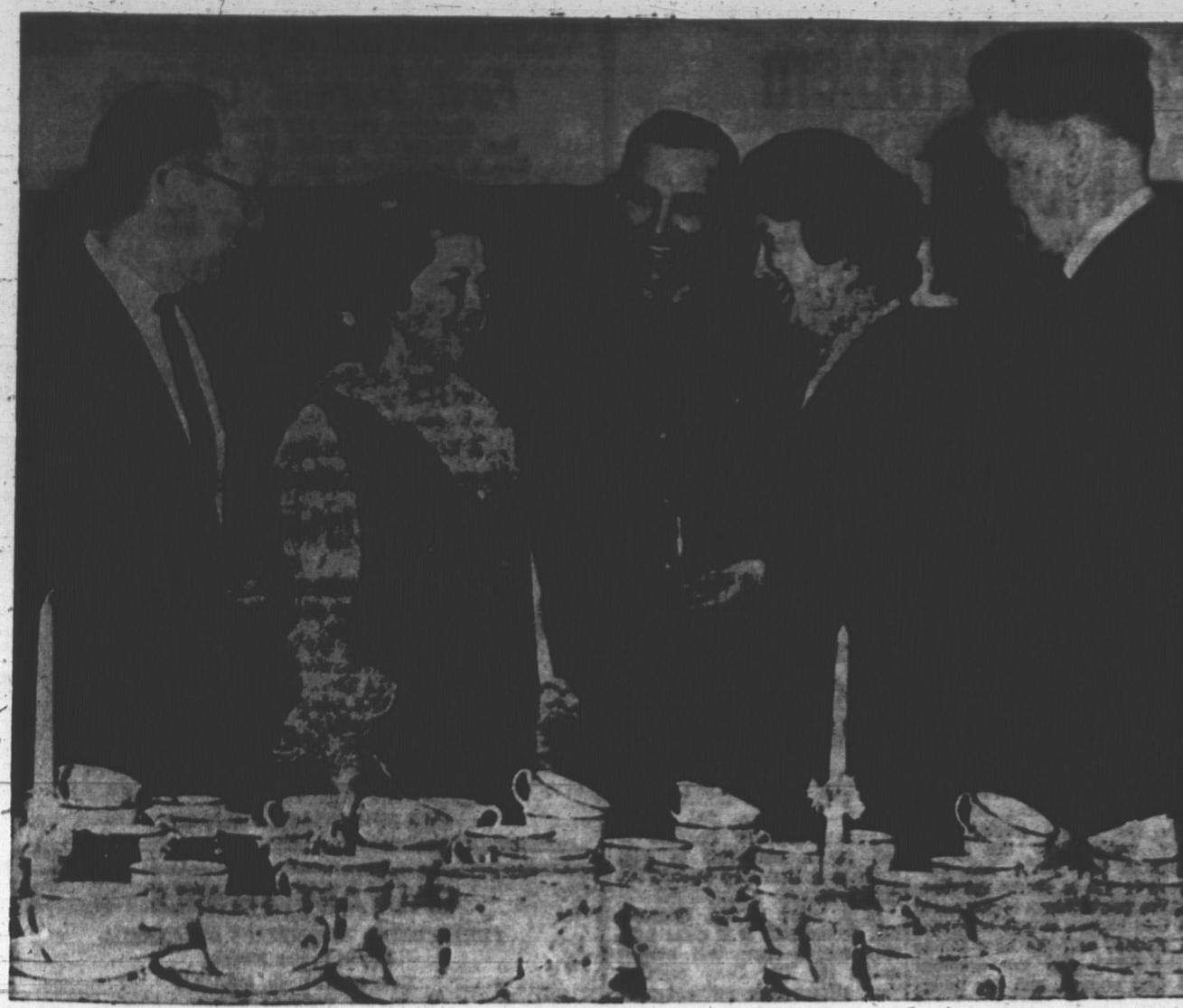

## 'Career Day' Is Observed At Montague High School

Murvin McInnis was chairman of a vocational guidance course at Montague Regional High School yesterday. The course was labelled "career day" by the students and the day was planned by the teachers under the guidance of Mr. McInnis. Pupils of grades 10, 11 and 12 were given the opportunity of attending the sessions and asking questions about careers in which they were interested. Introductory information about various vocations was presented
