The Antigonish Election

ANTIGONISH, Oct. 10. Hon. J. S. D. Thompson and Dr. McIntosh were nominated for the vacancy in the House of Commons, caused by Mr. McLaac accepting the county judgeship of Antigonish and Ioversness. Over one thousand people were present. Dr. McIntosh appealed to the electors for their support solely as an Independent Conservative, and as being a native of the County of Antigonish.

Hon. Mr. Thompson replied to the personal attacks made by Mr. McIntosh, and then entered upon an eloquent defence of the Dominion Government policy. The Minister of Justice will be elected by an overwhelming majority.
