Red Kelly Wins Lady Byng Trophy

MONTREAL, (CP)—For the second time in three years, the Red Kelly of Detroit Red Wings has won the Lady Byng Memorial Trophy, the National Hockey League announced Monday night. Kelly received 80 of a possible 90 points in the balloting by 18 hockey writers and broadcasters in the six NHL cities.

The trophy is awarded annually to "the player adjudged to have exhibited the best type of sportsmanship and gentlemanly conduct combined with a high standard of playing ability during the year."

Runner-up was Wally Hergesheimer, sophomore right-winger of New York Rangers, with 49 points. Sid Smith of Toronto Maple Leafs, winner last year, was third with eight points.

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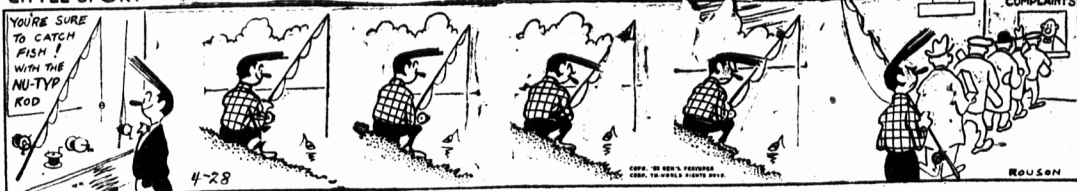

Harry Poulton To Fight For Dominion Title

One of the impressive features of the Little League baseball film being shown in the Province by Brooklin scout Bill O'Connor is the size of the ball players. For young fellows between the ages of eight and twelve they appear to be of unusually good size and unusually good ball players. Most of the players presumably are in the eleven or twelve year old brackets and the best of their ages in the States and they certainly are living testimony of the value of proper coaching among the youth.

This film should be a must for all youngsters planning to play ball this summer and for everyone who hopes to coach the younger teams. The film was made at Springfield College in Massachusetts and demonstrates all the basic techniques in fielding, batting, pitching, throwing and catching skills. Particular stress is made on the double play, hitting stances, fast ball throwing and sliding. It coincides with Little League World Series between teams from Texas and Connecticut.

QUEBEC, (CP)—The Canadian Boxing Federation yesterday announced that the winner of the Canadian middleweight championship fight between George Ross and Yvon Durelle of Halifax and Yvon Durelle of Bale St. Paul, Que., will have to defend the title against Harry "Kid" Poulton, Charlottetown, within 60 days.

The Ross-Durelle match is scheduled for May 2 at Glace Bay, N. S. It was announced by the CBF when the middleweight crown was lifted from Roy Wouters of Montreal for failing to defend it.

(Poulton carried out a highly successful campaign recently in Western Canada where he greatly impressed the fans by his impressive loss to Lou Lawrence on a split decision March 19 arousing the ire of fans and sportswriters.)

Demarco Wins 10-Round Decision

MONTREAL, (CP)—Paddy Demarco of Brooklyn, a contender for the world lightweight boxing championship, won a unanimous 10-round decision over Armand Savoie of Montreal, Canadian lightweight champion, Monday night. Demarco weighed 138 and Savoie 137.

Demarco, tough and rugged, threw to many punches for Savoie. The New Yorker continually crowded the Montrealer, tying him up and throwing hard rights to the kidneys.

Demarco had the fight pretty much his own way and gave Savoie little chance to box or cut in with his sharp-shooting rights.

For several hours, in a chat with Dave MacKay of the Moncton Times he stated that his coaching plans for the future were uncertain. The night before he left he Chamberlain told the same thing to the executive of the Islanders Hockey Club when they queried him about next season. The executive members did not offer Murph another contract and will not be talking contracts until after a general meeting is held and plans are formulated for next season.

Chamberlain intimated to MacKay that he would be interested in going to Moncton if he could secure the Hawks franchise and that they might take about eight members of this year's Islanders team with him. The player statement undoubtedly was meant to start the people of Moncton thinking. The Islanders only owned about five members of last year's squad and at least three of them would not go to Moncton.

Walter Pawlshyn, Steve Brklacich and George McLagan will be leaving for their homes in Central Canada this week and when they leave they will complete the breakup of the 1953 Islanders team. Pawlshyn is expected to leave within the next day or two while Brklacich and McLagan are leaving on Saturday. Brklacich stated yesterday that he enjoyed playing for the Islanders and Charlottetown this season and that he hoped to be back next year if the Islanders function. Steve is the property of the New York Rangers.

Allan Cup Opener Delayed One Day

KITCHENER, Ont., (CP)—The Allan Cup final between Penticon Vx and Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen will open here Tuesday night, one day later than the original date.

W. B. (Baldy) George, president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, originally said that the best-of-seven series would begin Monday night. However, it became necessary to change the opening date after it was learned that wrestling bouts were scheduled previously for Monday at the auditorium here.

All the games of the series are to be played here, with the second game Thursday night and the third Saturday.

Baseball Head Issues Anti-gambling Warning

NEW YORK, (AP)—Baseball commissioner Ford Frick, taking cognizance of clubhouse games for high stakes, issued a stern warning to all 16 major league clubs Monday against gambling and association with gamblers.

Frick's warning was hailed by club officials and managers who promised that every possible step would be taken to comply with his edict. All insisted that no gambling takes place on their clubs.

In a bulletin Frick ordered posted in all clubhouses, the commissioner called attention to the "evil of permitting card games among your players where the stakes are high." He said he had information that some players were losing more money than they can afford.

Frick also charged that players have frequently been seen in "gambling joints operating within a stone's throw from the park" and warned that players or club employees who are found to be gambling will be declared ineligible immediately.

"It's a damn sight better to head them off before something happens," Frick said, "than it is to take drastic action, such as expulsion, after it happens."

"Responsibility for stamping out this evil (gambling) rests squarely on the shoulders of the manager and this office will accept no alibi in cases that are brought to our attention."

Frick made it plain, however, that he knew of no case where a player was found to be gambling, other than card playing.

15 Horses Entered For The Derby Trial Today

LOUISVILLE, Ky., (AP)—Fifteen horses, most of them second-stringers as far as the Kentucky Derby is considered, are entered for the \$100,000-added Derby II Tuesday at Churchill Downs.

Royal Bay Gem, one of the solid horses considered to have a chance in the \$100,000 Derby run Saturday, tops the field for the one-mile trial although the distance may not be long enough for the stretching run of Royal Gem II.

Winner of the Chesapeake stakes at Bowie earlier this month, Royal Bay Gem is owned by Eugene Constantine, Dallas oil refiner.

Airmen Lead Going Into Final Match of Shoot
