

### Seeding Becomes General Throughout The Prairie Area

OTTAWA (CP)—Seeding is becoming general throughout the Prairies after cold weather and late-April blizzards temporarily held up field work, the bureau of statistics reported Wednesday in the first of its 1958 series of reports on Canadian crop conditions. Work has started on the land in New Brunswick although some low-lying areas in the Fredericton district are suffering from floods. Forage crops have not suffered during the winter. Cool weather has affected both Quebec and Ontario. Quebec meadows, fall wheat and fall rye appear to have wintered well. Some vegetable seeding has started in the St. Johns area.

OTTAWA — The Federal Department of Public Works has awarded a contract in the amount of approximately \$26,800.00 to Norman N. McLean, Murray River, P.E.I., for dredging an area at Miminegash, P.E.I. According to the contract work is to be satisfactorily completed within six months or on November 5, 1958. This work involves the removal of clay, sand and silt from the basin near the inner portions of two breakwaters averaging 400 feet by 250 feet. Approximately 30,000 cubic yards (place measurement) of material will be removed at the unit rate of 96 cents per cubic yard (place measurement).

Dr. Doll says he has discovered that severely physically handicapped cerebral palsied children with normal intelligence profited from association with physically fit mentally retarded, because the mentally retarded acted as the feet and hands for the cerebral palsied, and the cerebral palsied were the brains for the mentally retarded. The ego of each was thus bolstered. Dr. Doll groups these children of all levels of intelligence together as they all have problems, though not necessarily the same problems, and therein lies the therapeutic value says Dr. Doll.
