NORRIS PLAYS 1st GAME

Detroit Trims Rangers; Toronto Topples Bruins

NEW YORK (AP)—Ron Murphy scored twice in Detroit's four-goal second period outburst and the Red Wings whipped New York Rangers 4-1 Sunday night for their fourth straight National Hockey League victory.

The triumph boosted Detroit's playoff stock, lifting the Wings 11 points in front of the fifth-place Rangers.

Murphy opened and closed the second period scoring as the Wings rallied from a 1-0 deficit. He tied the count 1-1 at 1:33 after taking Norm Ullman's pass from behind the Range cage. Alex Delvecchio broke the

deadlock less than three minutes later, and Gordie Howe's power play goal made it 3-1 before Murphy connected again at 18:19. His 13th goal of the season, a twisting backhander from close in, also came with the Rangers shorthanded.

Delvecchio's go-ahead goal finished a two-man rush, with Parker MacDonald drawing an assist. Howe, who set up the two-one break, then scored from a goalmouth scramble while New York's Vic Hadfield was serving a penalty for cross-checking. MacDonald and Ullman assisted on the play.

Murphy scored his second goal with the Rangers' Rod Seling in the penalty box. Detroit goalie Roger Crozier, surprised in the game's opening minute by Hadfield's 13th goal, blanked the Rangers the rest of the way. He stopped 26 shots. Jacques Plante had 39 saves for New York.

CHICAGO (AP)—Denis Dejordi recorded his third shutout of the season as the Chicago Black Hawks blanked the National Hockey League leading Montreal Canadiens 3-0 Sunday night.

Veteran Doug Mohns paced the Chicago attack with a pair of goals, while the third Hawk marker was scored by Mohns' linemate, Kenny Wharram.

The victory, their first against the Canadiens in their last four meetings, pulled the Hawks to within two points of the Canadiens. Toronto remained four points back of Chicago in third place with a 4-2 victory over Boston.

Wharram gave Dejordi the only goal he was to need late in the first period when he took a 15-footer over Canadiens goalie Gump Worsley's out-stretched left pad.
