Dow Officials Are Convinced

MONTREAL (CP)—Dow Brewery Ltd. said in a newspaper advertisement published here Friday its decision to destroy 1,000,000 gallons of beer in Quebec City last month was the right one, even though it knew then, and it has been publicly confirmed since, that the beer was in perfect condition.

The previous increase was followed by the entry of three new producers, a general business slump and a weak market. "We're not back in a seller's market yet," a sales official said here. "But the market internationally and domestically has strengthened materially. We are extremely close to supply-demand balance, the closest since 1957."

One effect of the 1965 price increase, however, was to concentrate purchases at the end of 1964, with the result that 1965 Canadian shipments fell to 1,387,000 tons from 1,420,000 tons in 1964.

Sales officials here estimate that world production was 2,800,000 tons last year, with Canada accounting for more than 1,300,000 tons and the Soviet Union for about 1,800,000 tons in 1964.

Health Director Issues Statement

MONTREAL (CP)—Dr. Roland Lamquin, director of Montreal's health department, says consumption of whole milk with vitamin D added should be restricted to babies and growing children.

He made this statement as he issued a report drawn up by his department on the advisability of enriching whole milk with vitamin D in the interest of better health.

The report was made public following an announcement by a Montreal dairy that it was prepared to introduce the vitamin into its regular milk fluid.

Dr. Lamquin said too much vitamin D for adults can be harmful.

Except in rare cases, no national committee on nutrition had recommended consumption of vitamin D-enriched milk by adults.

The report said that to comply with Federal legislation whole milk should not contain an amount of vitamin D in excess of 400 international units per quart.

Health Director Issues Statement

Earlier, Dr. Donald Fraser, research physician at the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto, said that failure to add the vitamins in milk is causing rickets in children.

Mr. Davies, president of the Ontario Milk Distributors Association, said permission to add vitamin D to milk was granted last December. He was referring to changes in Canadian food and drug regulations which now allow the addition of the vitamin to fluid milk in amounts adequate to prevent rickets.

Dr. Lamquin said that although 100 cases of rickets were found in Montreal three years ago, "it is still a comparatively rare clinical entity."

EXPULSION MALAYAN PARTY

STOCKHOLM (AP)—The bureau of the Socialist International announced here Friday it has decided to expel the Malayan labor party as too Communist-influenced. It also announced that Prime Minister Lee Kuan Yew of Singapore, head of the People's Action party there, has been elected a member of the bureau, directing body of the International, now meeting here.

Opening lead—queen of diamonds.

Here is a remarkable hand from the match between Italy and the United States in 1958. A grand slam in either hearts or clubs would certainly have been a feasible undertaking, but at both tables only a game contract was reached with the North-South cards.

There were extraordinary circumstances, it is true. At both tables preemptive bid was made with the East-West cards, and this succeeded in blocking the smooth exchange of information between the North-South players.

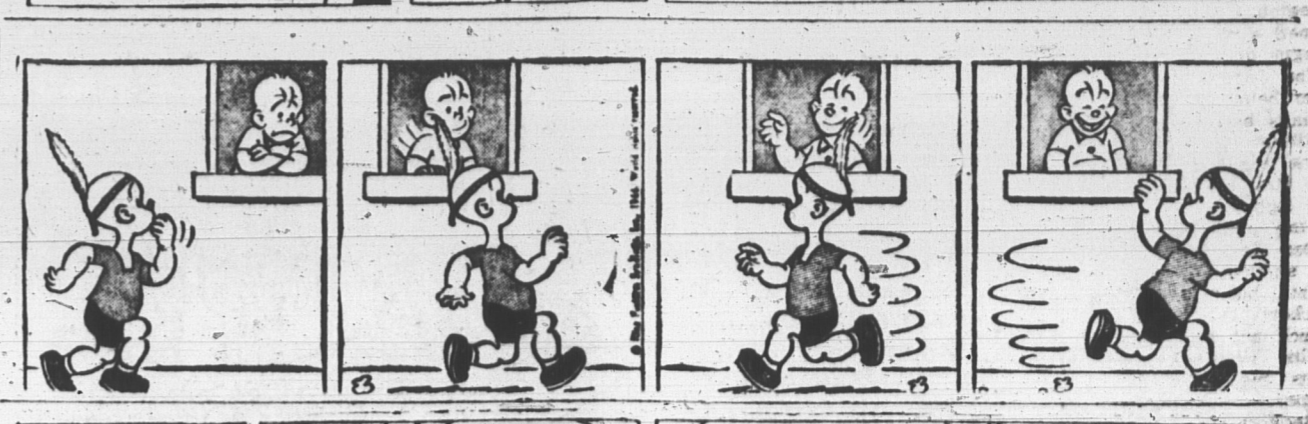
When the hand was played at my table, I opened the bidding with three diamonds. My partner, John Crawford, who knew I had very little defensive strength and who was suffering from the same deficiency himself, tried to jam the works further by bidding four diamonds.

Siniscalco, impressed more by his hand than our antics, bid five clubs; which was passed all around. A diamond was led and Siniscalco, looking much the worse for wear in having failed to reach either a small or grand slam, won the diamond and tackled trumps. When Crawford showed out, Siniscalco emitted a huge sigh of relief for having escaped a higher contract.

When the deal was played at the other table, the bidding went:
Belladonna did not preempt with the West hand, but East (Avarelli) did. He bid three spades.

The American South had a difficult bid to make and elected to overcall with three notrump. He would have been wiser to pass four diamonds doubled, instead he bid five clubs and made eleven tricks to tie the board.

Six hearts played by North could have been made, and, in fact, only a spade lead would have stopped seven. But the preemptive tactics at both tables made it difficult for North-South to find the best contract and succeeded in blocking out the hearts.



Mayor Brandt States Views

STOCKHOLM (AP)—An American withdrawal from Vietnam without a political solution and without security guarantees would help neither the peoples of Asia nor the peace of the world, Mayor Willy Brandt of West Berlin said as he opened an international Socialist debate on world problems.

"I do not doubt that American policy is interested in a peaceful solution—no one ought to discourage the Americans in such efforts, or act as if the decision on peace lay with the United States alone," said Brandt, leader of West Germany's Socialist party.

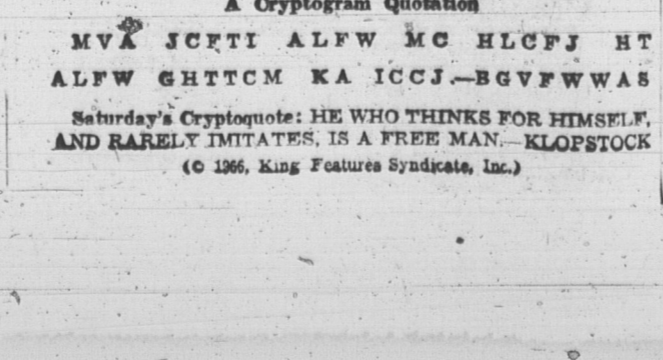
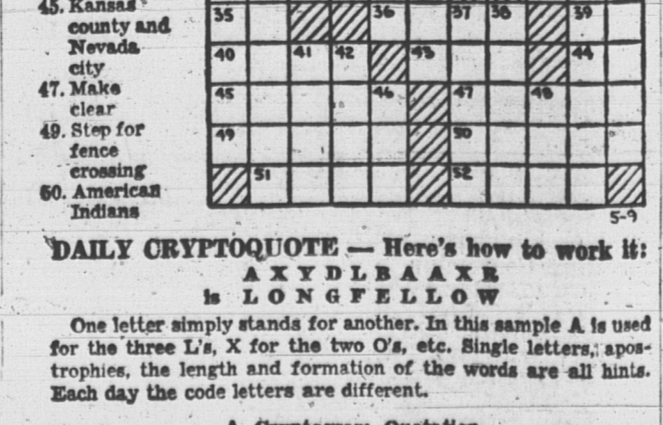
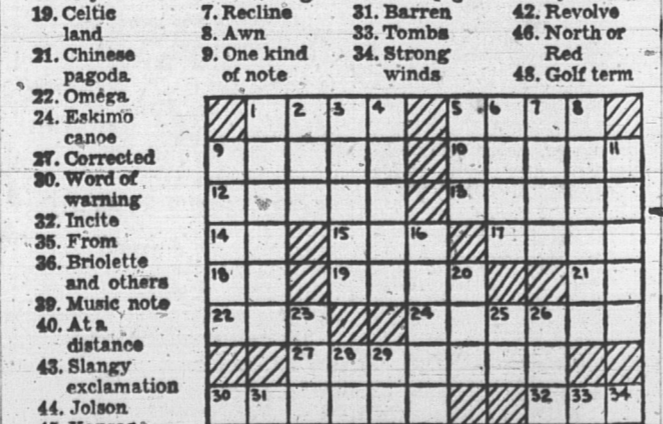
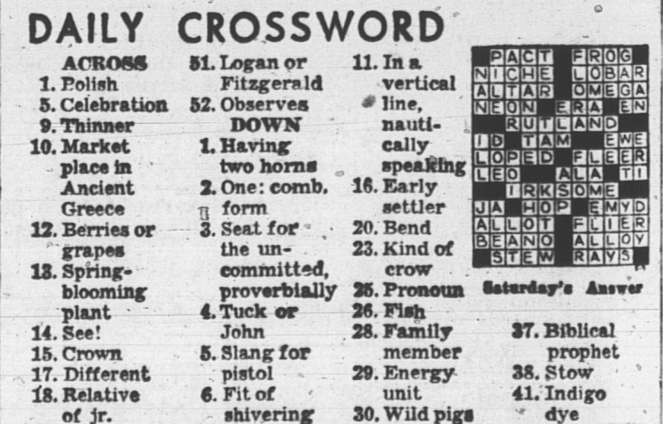
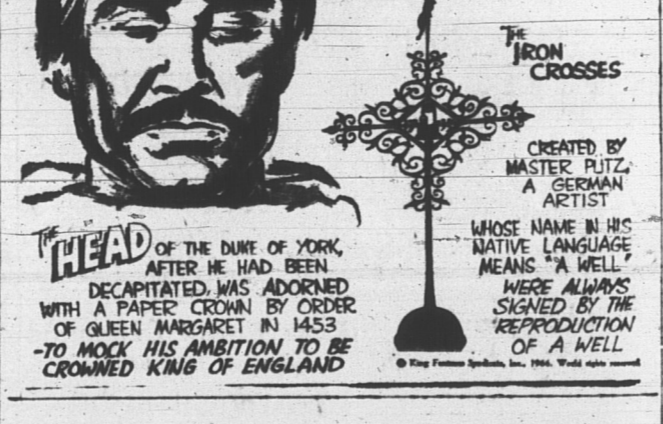
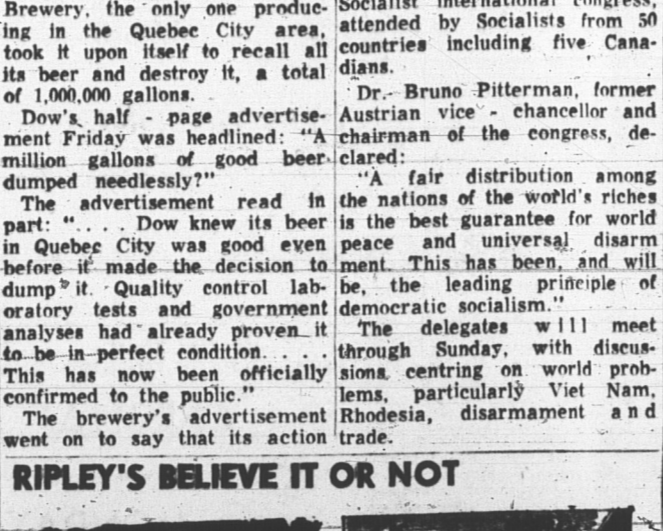
He and Prime Minister Tage Erlander of Sweden gave the opening speeches in the first general debate at the fourth Socialist international congress, attended by Socialists from 50 countries including five Canadians.

Dr. Bruno Pitterman, former Austrian vice-chancellor and chairman of the congress, declared:

"A fair distribution among the nations of the world's riches is the best guarantee for world peace and universal disarmament. This has been, and will be, the leading principle of democratic socialism."

The delegates will meet through Sunday, with discussions centering on world problems, particularly Viet Nam, Rhodesia, disarmament and trade.
