Amateur Boxers To Fight In Kingston Wed.-Friday KINGSTON (CP)—Canada's outstanding amateur boxer, Les Maclean, N.S., heads the list of 87 competitors who will take part here Wednesday, Thursday and Friday in Canada's biggest boxing show, the second annual Canadian Army boxing championships.

The bouts will take place at the 4,000-seat Kingston Community Centre. Preliminary eliminations will be staged in the afternoon and evening of the first two days with the finals Friday night.

In all 20 championships will be declared, 10 each in the novice and open classes. The winners and any outstanding novices will be groomed for the Canadian amateur championships which are scheduled to be held at Camrose, Alta., in May.

The army boxers will be concentrated at Camp Wainwright, Alta., for a month before the amateur title bouts.

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—The new 20-second rule is not an opening for the long-out-umpire Joe Paparella says.

Manager Lou Boudreau recently voiced fear pitchers would take advantage of the rule that requires them, when no one is on base, to deliver the ball to the plate within 20 seconds after receiving it on the mound.

No official reply was made to Boudreau squawk but sportswriters covering the Grapefruit League reported quick returns have been disallowed whenever attempted.

Paparella, in an interview with sportswriter Joe McGuff of the Kansas City Star, explains his interpretation: "If the pitcher is on the rubber when he gets the call from a catcher and makes a quick delivery to the plate, I am not going to allow the pitch."

"The pitcher should be off the rubber when he gets the ball. After he receives it he must take his normal stretch, or if he is pitching without a windup, he must hold the ball in a normal position and pause. Then the batter must be ready to hit."

"This is my interpretation of the rule and I think it is right. If you let the pitcher grab the ball and throw it right back when the hitter isn't looking then someone is going to get hurt. I don't intend to stand around and see a batter injured because of quick pitches."
