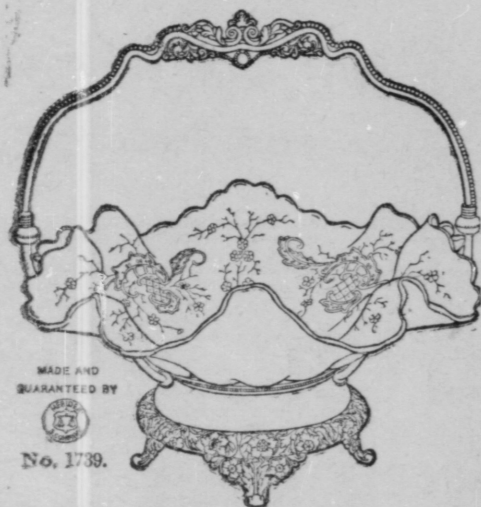

The meeting of the Stock Breeders Association this afternoon and the subsequent meetings will be held in the old Board of Trade Rooms, Masonic Temple.

The meetings to have been held at Pownal, North Wiltshire and Marsfield last night did not materialize on account of the unfavorable weather. A meeting was held at North River, however, which was addressed by President Elderkin and Mr. B. L. Fawcett. The attendance was not large, but the addresses were of the highest interest.

It is pointed out by the Montreal Gazette that Mr. Mercier won two victories in Quebec, quite as remarkable as those achieved by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Tarte. Then he was overwhelmed. ## CONVENTION AT SOURIS.

## Fatal Railway Accident.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Nov. 27.—A special to the Commercial Tribune from Charleston, W. Va., says: "It is reported here that a Chesapeake and Ohio train went through the Green River bridge, which had been damaged by prevailing floods. It is supposed that there were about 200 people on the train and that all were lost. All the wires are down at and near the crossing of this river, and it is impossible to get any sort of confirmation of the disaster. Even the railway officials are unable to secure communication with points on either side of the river."
