Batgate Focuses Decider As Rangers Nip Leafs 3-2

NEW YORK (CP) — Right winger Andy Bathgate equalled a National Hockey League record and rookie Rod Gilbert scored a pair of goals Wednesday night as the Toronto Rangers defeated Toronto Maple Leaf 3-2.

The Leafs grabbed a 2-0 lead on goals by Frank Mahovlich his third of the season, and center Dave Semenko. But the Rangers stormed back to tie the score 2-2 in the second and to take the game on Gilbert's third-period goal.

Batgate, in scoring New York's first goal, midway through the second period, matched the record of scoring in each of nine straight games. The mark was established by former Montreal Canadian right winger Maurice Richard in 1944-45 and equaled two seasons ago by Bernie Geoffrion of the Canadiens.

NEAR RECORD — Batgate, the league's leading point getter, has scored one goal in each of the last nine games and has a chance to break the record Saturday night at Montreal. Richard scored 14 goals during his nine-game streak.

Another star of last night's game was New York goaltender (Lump) Gorsley, who kicked out 47 Toronto drives, including several in the final minute when the Leafs removed goalie Don Simmons for a sixth

attacker. Simmons made 19 saves in the stretch.

The victory stretched the fifth-place Rangers' unbeaten streak to four games, including two ties. It was the second time the Leafs were beaten 3-0 by last place Boston Bruins Tuesday night.

The Rangers now have 20 points, nine fewer than fourth-place Detroit and ten more than Boston. The Leafs remained in second place, five points behind Chicago and two ahead of third-place Montreal.
