Count De Sarriges, French Minister in Rome, had an audience with Pius IX. to-day at the Vatican.

The Minister officially assured his Holiness in the name of the Emperor Napoleon, that whatever circumstances should arise from the Garibaldian invasion of the Pontifical territory of the attitude of the King of Italy, France would not fail in her aid to the Holy See, and defence of its authority.

The garrison of Rome has been reinforced by volunteers enlisted for the most part in France and Spain.

The town of Orto, lately taken by the revolutionary invaders, has been re-occupied by a detachment of the Papal army.

The Commercial Bank of Canada has suspended.

The ministerial crisis is not ended. Gen. Cialdini has been unable to form a new Cabinet, and has given up the task.

It is possible that Rattazzi may remain in office with perhaps a few changes in his ministry.

An extreme bitter feeling is shown against France, while the government of the King is loaded with reproaches by the people for yielding to the dictation of Napoleon.

There have been several demonstrations of indignation in Florence.

The populace gather in great numbers beneath the windows of the government offices and shout for Rome as the capital of Italy.

Reports are in circulation that General Garibaldi has not only eluded the vigilance of the government in making his escape from Capri, but has succeeded in reaching Italy and is now with his own Menotti.

It is reported that the Grand Duchy of Baden will soon join the Confederation of the North German States.

The Monitor of this morning, in its official article announcing the cessation of war preparations against Italy, says:—

France beheld the spectacle of the invasion of the Papal States by armed bands from the neighboring provinces of Italy. She could not, consistently with her duty, her dignity and her national honor, suffer the September Convention to be thus violated, she prepared to send an army across the Alps and a fleet to Rome. But Italy has given ample pledges to fulfil on her part the obligations of the Treaty in the largest sense, and consequently all hostile preparations have been suspended by France.

The Austrian Admiral Tegethoff has returned to Havana from Vera Cruz. The Mexicans refuse to surrender the body of Maximilian.

Additional advices received from Rome acknowledge that the Garibaldians have not all retired from the territory of the Church, but represent that the pontifical troops have had skirmishes with remnants of the insurgent bands in which they have been uniformly successful.

Despatches from Florence say it was known in that city early last week that General Garibaldi had traversed Italy and succeeded in reaching Tollune in the Province of Calabria, and that his arrival there had been discovered and he was forbidden by the Italian authorities to proceed any further.

The London Times to-day has a strong editorial on French intervention. It stigmatises the compulsory course of France as cruel to Italy and perilous to Europe, and declares that its effect will be transient, for the Garibaldians must rise again and a new enterprise is unavoidable.

The latest despatches announce the departure of a French fleet from Toulon, to finally put a stop to the movements of Garibaldi, who, at latest accounts, was within a few miles of Rome, at the head of a formidable force.

A Fenian cruiser has been captured off the coast of Ireland. Gold 143.

The Scher, "Cygnet," Anderson, from Charlottetown, for Boston, sprung a leak on Saturday last about 10 miles east of Cape Sable, and foundered in about an hour afterwards. She had a cargo of mackerel, codfish, &c., which, as well as the vessel, was only partly insured. The crew saved themselves in the vessel's boat, but the Captain lost a valuable watch and spriglass.
