[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Notes from the Capital. OTTAWA, April 25.

The Privy Council met on Saturday afternoon to consider the seizure of a fishery vessel at Baddeck, C. B., but the nature of the decision arrived at is unknown.

The Wimbledon team sails from Canada on June 24th.

There is a statement current to-night that Senator Plumb has been appointed Postmaster General vice Sir Alexander Campbell who becomes Lieutenant Governor of Ontario, and that Lieutenant Governor Dewdney, of North West Territory, becomes Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia.

Mutiny of Convicts.

OTTAWA, April 23. The convicts of St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary broke into revolt yesterday, overpowered the guards on duty and seized their revolvers. The other guards being turned out, a desperate fight ensued in which the Warden was dangerously wounded. One convict was killed and several severely wounded before the convicts were secured.

Home Rule.

LONDON, April 24. Home Rule holds the field in Ireland. Scarcely anything else is discussed in public. In both countries, too, Gladstone's bill holds the field. The discussion aids them, and since their introduction the chances of their passing the Commons have never been greater than at present. The Home Rule bill is now certain of passing.

Opposition Meeting.

MONTGOMERY, April 25. The Opposition meeting here on Saturday night was a grand success. One thousand people were present, nearly all of whom were electors, and the candidates were received with unbounded enthusiasm.

ADEN, April 25. The report is confirmed that the Emir of Haran has massacred all the Europeans in his capital, also the members of the Italian scientific expedition, under Count Porro.

BALTIMORE, Md., April 24. The Captain of the steamship Sylvia, which arrived to-day reports having boarded the abandoned bark Rowland Hill, of St. John, N. B., on the 16th inst.

WELLAND, Ont., April 25. The body of a young man named Farr was found in the river last night. He had been missing some time, and it is supposed he committed suicide.

DRESDEN, Ont., April 24. Mrs. Lyle and her three year old child were drowned in the river here last evening. The child fell over the bank and the mother jumped after it.

OTTAWA, April 24. Sir Alexander Campbell is better, but not yet out of bed.

MADRID, April 24. The Bishop of Madrid, who was shot by a Priest, has died of his injuries.
