SHORTLY after the opening of the new Federal building it was noted that box holders were having difficulty due to the fact that mail in their boxes would be drawn back into the Post Office space by the wind should the box be opened at the same time the main doors are opened.

MR. MACNAUGHT had brought this matter to the attention of the Hon. Alphonse Fournier, Minister of Public Works, and in his letter to Mr. MacNaught he stated that this trouble had been noted before in other places and had been satisfactorily remedied by the installation of a grill above the letter box.

THE COMMUNICATION also advised Mr. MacNaught that the desk in the main lobby, along the west wall would be continued out into the night lobby to enable box holders to sort their mail after taking it from their boxes.

Patients Flown From Tyne Valley To Hospital

FLYING his single engine plane, used daily on The Guardian airlift to Western Prince County, Paul Sharpe yesterday landed on the river ice at Tyne Valley and picked up a patient, Miss Myrtle Ramsay from the Tyne Valley Hospital and brought her to the Prince County Hospital in Summerside.

MR. SHARPE, with his patient, landed on the harbor ice in Summerside about mid-afternoon. He hailed a passing box sleigh which took Miss Ramsay to the shore where she was met by ambulance and rushed to the Prince County Hospital.

LAST night her condition was reported as fair and that she was resting as comfortably as could be expected. This was the patient for which blood had been sent by snowmobile from Summerside Thursday night. However, the attempt was unsuccessful.

ANOTHER patient, Mrs. Herman Barrett, was flown from Tyne Valley by Mr. Sharpe, this time to the Charlottetown Hospital. Flights yesterday by planes from Paul's Flying Service on mercy or emergency missions, brought the total of such trips to more than 100 since the service was inaugurated several years ago, it was learned.

Death Thursday Of Mr. Richard Foley

Prince County Hospital Board Hold Meeting

DUE to a small attendance of the trustees at the regular meeting of the Prince County Hospital board held on Thursday evening, Feb. 21 no further action was taken regarding plans for holding a financial drive for funds to build a nurses home but a special meeting will be called as soon as the roads are open. At the last meeting a decision was taken to hold a drive but no plans were made.

THE PRESIDENT Mr. J. Frank Arnett presided at the meeting and there were nine members of the board present. The president reported that he had received a letter from Dr. R.H. Kennedy of the department of Veterans Affairs Charlottetown, advising that the order prohibiting the use of the Prince County Hospital for pensioned veterans had been rescinded.

MR. DONALD Baker, chairman of the building committee, reported that the work of remodeling the old hospital is progressing favorably under the forgoingmanship of Mr. W.R. Maynard.

SUPERINTENDENT report showed that three preliminary nurses had received their caps during the month, out of the present class of twenty two. She also reported that the provincial organization plans on putting on a nurse recruiting campaign in the spring.

DURING the month there were 317 patients admitted and 315 discharge. There was some discussion regarding the proposed fund raising campaign but as the country trustees could not be present it was thought better to defer the matter until they could be in attendance.
