MONCTON - The long corridors of Canadian National's terminal building in Moncton may yet, resound in the stirring shriek of the bagpipes.

Colin T. Cameron, general manager of Canadian National Atlantic region, confided he is toying with the idea of bringing his pipes to the office on weekends, after due warning to the cleaning ladies and the doorman.

Mr. Cameron is to judge the bagpipe drumming and pipe band competitions at this year's Highland Games in Antigonish, N.S. July 15 and 16.

His interest in all things Scottish is much more than light-hearted, although he has a wealth of stories to point up the

lighter sides of tradition and tartan. Mr. Cameron was born in Elgin, Scotland, and began piping at the age of seven, drumming a few years later and a music of one form or another for more than 20 years.

"Piping is music in its highest form - that may leave itself open to a misinterpretation by the non-believers," says Mr. Cameron. "But it is a most inspiring and noble sound."

His judging abilities have been put to good use across Canada. He judged 180 contestants at Vancouver during highland games there while in the west and has had to just recently turn down an offer to serve as judge at contests in Manitoba because of his busy work schedule.

Mr. Cameron has expressed pleasant surprise at the interest and quality in piping and drumming in the Maritimes. "The quality of piping has improved in Canada over the years especially among female pipes."

"By and large, the women are almost as good as the best of the male pipes," commented Mr. Cameron. "Besides, they usually look much better than men wearing the kilt."

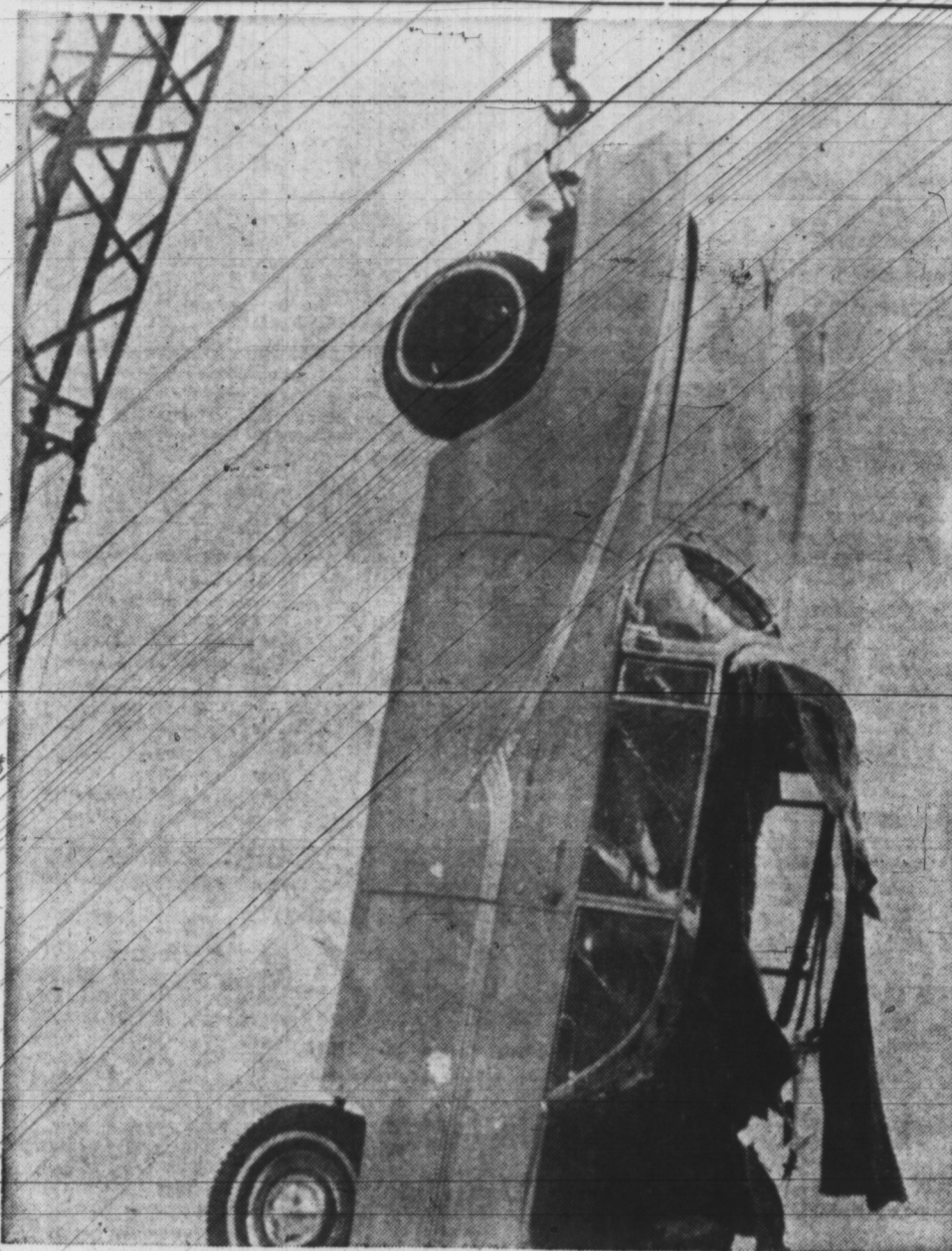
