CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (CP-AP)—U.S. astronaut Malcolm Scott Carpenter Thursday became the second U.S. man to circle the earth, making a three-orbit trip that ended with almost an hour's frightening uncertainty about his safe return. He was plucked from the sea by a helicopter after landing 250 miles beyond his target area.

Recovery's Preceded By Frightening Silence

As for Carpenter's capsule, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said it was picked up from the water by the destroyer *Pierce* and was being taken to Roosevelt Roads, Puerto Rico. From there it was to be flown back to Cape Canaveral. There was no immediate word of its condition, officials said.
