Last Tuesday at noon the students returned from the Easter holidays to resume their studies. It seems hard to believe that there remains only one month in the college year. Since the time is short and there is much work to be done, we anticipate a busy month. In general, the students were of the opinion that they had a "muddy" time during the holidays. Although the majority of the students spent their holidays at home, the French-speaking students remained here as the duration of the holidays did not make a return trip to Quebec worthwhile.
