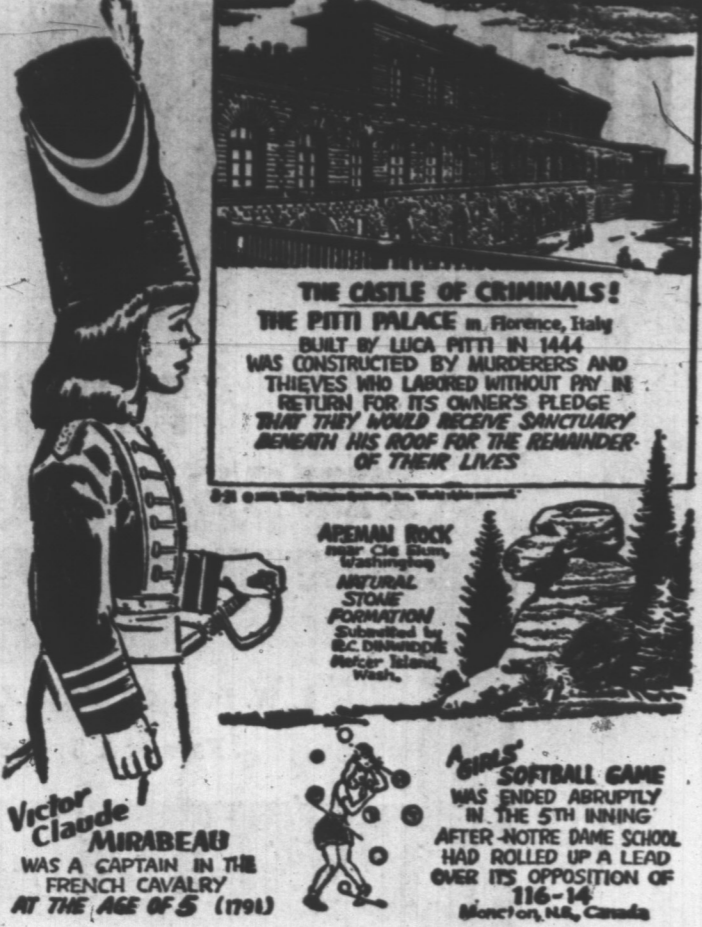

Congress Will Ask Expulsion Of S.A.

WINNIPEG (CP) - The Canadian Labor Congress will ask that South Africa be expelled from the Commonwealth unless that country ends its racial segregation policy.
The warning was given Tuesday by CLC president Claude Jodoin now attending a congress executive meeting in Winnipeg.
The congress urged Prime Minister Diefenbaker to raise the matter at the next Commonwealth conference and urged the Canadian government to "speak up boldly and unequivocally on this issue."
Should such effort fail, the Canadian Labor Congress will call for the exclusion of South Africa from the Commonwealth of Nations.
Mr. Jodoin said the CLC has received authentic and documented reports on the results of the South African race policy.
"These speak of the inhumane condition prevailing in the so-called prison farms and other farms principally owned by Afrikaners; of the introduction of whipping as a compulsory punishment for a whole range of minor offences; of the mass trials and imprisonments of the native population; of such inhumane laws and practices as the pass laws, residential restrictions, educational and other forms of segregation.
"It is obvious to us that these policies constitute a system of forced labor, repeatedly condemned and prohibited by the UN and the ILO.
"South Africa is a member of the Commonwealth of Nations," Mr. Jodoin said, "and it is the duty of Canada and the other members of the Commonwealth to do everything within their power and exert every form of pressure on the government of South Africa to change its policy and to live up to the elementary standards of decency."

Officials Join To Give Help To Travellers

DAWSON CREEK, B.C. (CP) - Canadian and United States officials have joined forces in a move to ensure that "Alaska-or-bust" adventurers reach their destination.
Canadian immigration officials said too many of the travellers, who start out in old jalopies with little cash, are going bust on the Canadian section of the 1,527-mile route which connects Dawson Creek with Fairbanks, Alaska.
While U.S. authorities are responsible for the rescue of their bankrupt countrymen, Canadians sometimes are forced to "grub-stake" the would-be pioneers.
Derelict autos that break down along the route are abandoned, giving the highway an appearance of a junk heap, officials say.
Canadian authorities have set a minimum requirement of \$250 for a car and driver, plus \$100 for each additional passenger and a valid credit card before allowing Americans to set out for Fairbanks.
Some of the marooned Americans have been U.S. Air Force personnel headed for Alaska bases. As a result the Alaskan air command has joined forces with Canadian officials and instructed

Laos Trouble Seen Delaying China's Entry

QUEBEC (CP) - Although Communist China "inevitably" will become a member of the United Nations recent troubles in Tibet and Laos have delayed her entry, says New Zealand's High Commissioner to Canada.
Foss Shanahan, in his first official trip to Quebec City since his appointment as high commissioner last year, said Wednesday in an interview Red China's admission to the United Nations is "only a matter of time."
"Recent events in Tibet and Laos have shown us, however, that the time is not ripe yet."

Water Supply Nearing End, Says Professor

MONTREAL (CP) - Professor A. T. Ippen of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology says the world is approaching the end of its available water supplies and industries should pay increasing attention to method of re-use.
Here for the annual meeting of the International Hydraulic Association, Professor Ippen said in an interview that water will become a luxury as population increases.
"Industries are great consumers of water," Mr. Ippen said. "Often they make a rather wasteful use of it, but as the scarcity increases they will be forced to be more efficient. Very often plants can make use of less water and also make repeated use of the same supply."
Discussing the ice problem in areas like Canada he said that a great deal of basic research still has to be done. He said he regrets that university students are neglecting the hydraulic field though there are great possibilities in it.
