Canadian Fashions Are Interesting And Smart

The softened silhouette is the main point of the story of Canadian fashions for spring 1957, according to a survey of top Montreal fashion houses. It is a story with many angles but all combine to give the new styles a completely fresh look.

Canadian retail store buyers have completed their search of the fashion centre of Canada and the styles they have chosen are now being shown across the country. The new trends which have been underlined by their selection, according to the style houses, are as follows:

SILHOUETTE—The softened silhouette makes last season's skin-tight sheath look dated. This will be good news to women with less than perfect figures. The fashion features which contribute to the softening process are blouses, jackets, capes, cummerbunds and hipline pleats and darts. Blousing varies from the all-round fullness caught into a drawing belt, to modified shirring set above the back of the waistline. Jackets are many and the newest is the brief, buttoned-up mess jacket. Draped cummerbunds and the manipulation of darts and pleats to give a rounded effect to the hipline all add up to the softened look.

CAPE—A story by itself, the cape which was first launched in Paris last fall seems to have completely captured the imagination of world designers. Already firmly established in Canadian fashion, there are capes of all shapes and lengths from capelets which are little

more than an oversized collar, to full-length cocoon shaped toppers. There are cape sleeves, shoulder capes, detachable capes, and capes to be worn alone or as part of a costume.

LENGTH—The longer skirt also predicted by Paris is definitely here. Most of the top fashion houses have added from one to four inches to skirt length as well as providing deeper hems to allow for individual preferences. The new lengths complement the silhouette and the rule seems to be, "the longer in the day, the longer the length."

FABRICS—Fashion fabrics have also become softer and more feminine in line with the new silhouette. The lightweight woollens and new tweeds have abandoned their rough, rustic look. Textured fabrics are important but are more of the raw silk, silk linen and soft tweeds of silk or blends of silk and cotton. Sheer crepes are staging a strong comeback especially in afternoon wear and the soft, completely feminine chiffons are top choice for after dark.

COLOR—The color fashionable women will see and hear the most about this spring is violet. New shades of lavender, mauve, lilac and perma blue ranging from deep to light shades and from bluish to pinkish tones will be seen combined with blues and greens especially in prints. Navy Blue the perennial favorite color choice for spring is a perfect foil for these shades in accessories. Navy is said to be getting stiff competition this year from black and new soft greys are a popular choice.

ELLEN'S DIARY

There Was Great Respect For A Man Of The Cloth

The new Minister of the "Old Kirk", about his pastoral visitations, called at Alderlea yesterday. And remained a while to quote the Scriptural verities and offer prayers after the custom of such "Kirk's" ministers, as we remember it all down through our years.

How well we can recall those occasions in our girlhood home, and the faces of the successive men-of-God of those times—the solemn, the smiling, the saintly, the kindly whose pastoral visits from the manse now far away, gathered in the little and large of the family to have it might be each name presented for an especial blessing before Heaven's throne. Not that they as it was, being born healthy and well to make group of eight with kind and industrious parents, though we may say not always indulgent, were not already well blest. But there was added comfort in being named in name by a man-of-cloth. Then on young knees and behind closed eyelids, one got a glimpse of that glory so radiantly bright that before it even angels veil faces.

So, as we listened our years dropped away and scenes long gone came to mind. Ministers came to me to teach us to respect all men-of-God, there were those whose sincerity, and charm, either natural or cultivated, like One of old, "drew all... unto them."

"And how are you this day Ellen?" one would ask, if we chanced as a little girl to meet him in the store or on the street. "Nicely, thank you, Sir" we would reply a bit shyly.

And are you The Lord's child today? was invariably the next question, put with the nicest smile. "Yes, Sir" we managed to nod, getting a glimpse in the very query into a fair and promised land.

And remembering such things, now, we wonder if folks in home and church realize how important children are—that the hope of the world, its well-being and peace rests not with the adults of older generations but with the children of now. They must be taught by example, as well as by considered words, that love and tolerance and understanding are the basis

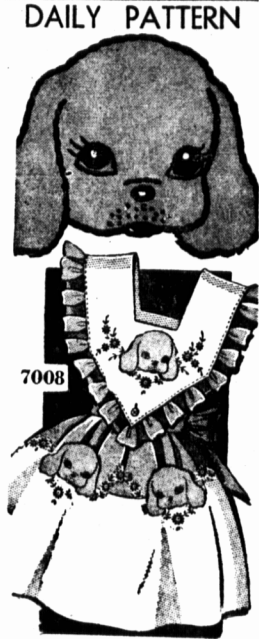
of all Christian ways.

The new minister comes from distant scenes. He and his wife, as a consecrated young couple came some years ago from their native Ireland "by way of Boston to the State of Nebraska" and later "to Prince Edward Island" and the accents retained as memories of Erin with its many enchantments, add their own share of charm to the truths expressed as they, like that spire we turn to when we walk a woodland road up a rise at Alderlea, point folks toward Heaven's grace.

They succeed in the new manse, the island-born Scottish couple who first set lights in its windows, and have since been called to minister to the historic St. John's church at Belfast and her congregation. And as we look back now, it is to be aware that hers was ever a loving and kindly service, and that it was with much earnestness and inspiration he "divided unto us" the Scriptures. And in his prayers we could recognize that nearness of supplication which stems, we believe, form a Gaelic mother-tongue. And as a Family, we shall ever remember his kindness on those occasions when it was our turn to taste unexpected of the waters of bereavement in the loss of loved ones suffered during his time of stay.

More Fashion Information Comes Through From Paris

Paris in the springtime—or at any season of the year—continues to send us the fashion news. Cape coats or jackets which look very like capes when viewed from the back have replaced last season's beautiful but not popular traditional capes. Dropped shoulders are news everywhere—the shoulder line is still soft and rounded, but definitely widened with pleats, bias seaming, intricate folds, soft cow treatments or a cape-flare at the back. Balmain's were extremely beautiful and wearable in checks, diagonals and shetlands. Castillo's were superbly done in hosiery, checks and one even in chiffon lined with wool crepe.

Blouses, blouses everywhere—never has Paris shown them so beautifully or in such profusion. Every suit has one—overblouses, tuck-in-blouses, sweater blouses, wrap blouses, pleated blouses, draped blouses—in crepes, in sheers, in semi-sheers and crisp fabrics as well.

Castillo's collection at Lanvin according to press and buyers alike, was the most beautiful and inspirational ever to come from this talented designer's workrooms. Castillo has given an enchanting French touch to a Japanese theme derived from the ancient Kamekono silk scrolls. Jackets of day-time clothes are reminiscent of kimonos—cut off at the hips, with wide sleeves, often turned back to show contrasting linings. Apron skirts open in front to reveal easy sheaths... or fold over in the back. Oh! sashes give the slightly raised waistline Castillo loves. In all, an ideal collection applauded by all who saw it.

It is just ten years since Dior launched his revolutionary new look, to celebrate his anniversary, the Master has drawn inspiration from every corner of the globe. The collection theme is "liberty"—easy, fluid lines with talented attention given to details. Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh are scheduled to come to Paris in April. Dior salutes the impending royal visit with a sophisticated series of mid-calf length sheaths which have square ground-trailing trains. His birthday salute to the world is a magnificent group of grand ball gowns—each dedicated to a different country or major world capital.

"Accent on youth" is the theme of Marc Bohan's collection for Patou—oldest of the top couture houses. Featured were short, short skirts... simple school-girlish dresses charmingly draped at the natural waist... white Peter Pan collars... box jacket suits... glorious print floral chiffon and organza

party dresses. There are two major silhouettes at Maison Heim... a puffed "Bubble" silhouette, which features puffed fullness at the hip and tapers to a slim hem... a tired-tunic silhouette which most often divides the figure into three fairly equal areas.

There's a new, bright and shining star on the Paris fashion horizon—Guy Laroche. Tumultuous applause followed the showing of this talented young designer's first Haute Couture collection. His fabric selections were impeccable... his clothes youthful, supple and wearable... his silhouette basically slim with exquisite cowl drapery falling diagonally to the waist in back. A name to be watched—Guy Laroche.

Hats are varied—gone are the cumbersome "hatty" hats of last season. Here, again, Madame has a choice... she'll find high crowned cloches at Balmain—back-of-the-head sailors at Chanel—feminized sou'westers at Dior—melon crowned hats at Patou—exotic sheer turbans, lacquered hairpins, lacquered hairbows and "stand-up" ornaments at Lanvin—"Shower caps" or "dustcaps" in luxurious fabrics at Laroche—off-the-face hats at Heim.

'Tis a colorful season in Paris—navy and soft-sea blues in abundance—taupy shades often combined with pearl grey—mimosas and lemon yellows—cherry blossom pink, coral and lacquer red—palest mauve—and, as always, black combined with white for day-time and starkly dramatic for evening.

And, so the tour is finished... a tour so beautiful that it almost takes your breath away... a tour that proves once again that Paris is, and will doubtless remain, the world capital of fashion.

CHOCOLATE CAKE

1 1/2 cups flour
1/2 cup shortening
2 eggs
1 cup sugar
1 cup sweet milk
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. baking powder
2 squares chocolate or 1 large tbs. cocoa

Cream butter and sugar add egg yolks, well beaten; add vanilla. Sift all dry ingredients, add alternatively with milk. Fold in egg whites, well beaten, last.
