## HOSPITAL FOR INSANE— AN INVESTIGATION.

The Government has been constrained to hold an investigation "into the past and present management of the Hospital for the Insane." It is to be hoped that the scope of the enquiry will be strictly limited; for if not the Commissioners will be at work all summer, heavy cost will be entailed, and little practical good will be done. What the public is particularly interested in is the present condition and management of the institution, to the end that a reform may be accomplished wherever reform is necessary. That which was done or left undone ten, or fifteen, or twenty years ago is of no importance at all, in so far as a reform is concerned.

### THE GERRYMANDER.

A telegram from Ottawa states that there has been considerable discussion in the House of Commons "over the ebullience in Prince Edward Island. Mr. Martin quoted from Davies' language in 1892, in which he predicted that some day a new party would come in, which would frame a measure not founded on justice or based on the constitution, but intended wholly for party advantage. Davies, Mr. Martin said, was admirably carrying out his own prediction. Mr. McDonald, P. E. Island, also condemned the P. E. Island clause." All men of fair play and good will must join in the commendation of Messrs McDonald and Martin. To give King's County but one representative while Prince and Queen's Counties have two each is unjust and everyone sees the injustice. The Senate will do well, if they amend the bill, and maintain the present electoral divisions.

### LOBSTER PACKER'S GRIEVANCE.

Disappointment is the feeling of those lobster packers on the South Shore, who have been denied the "extension of time" for which they asked. To disappointment is added indignation on the part of many who see that what they asked for in vain has been freely granted their competitors who have factories west of Carleton Head. It is true that the invidious distinction was made on the recommendation of "The Lobster Commission"—so named, probably because the majority of its members knew as much about the merits of the questions in dispute as the lobster packers themselves! However this may be, the Commission did not hold a meeting east of Summerside and did not hear the representations of those packers east of Carleton Head who have been refused the desired extension. The unfairness of this treatment is made manifest by reference to the report of the Board of Trade which sets forth that 16,000 cases of lobsters were packed last year in Prince County, 11,000 cases in Queens and 15,112 in Kings. Queens and Kings had clearly a superior claim to the consideration of "The Lobster Commission" and the Government. But Queens and Kings received apparently no consideration at all; or if their claims were considered it was only that they might be denied. In accord with the "Linger Longer" principle which actuates the Government in respect to everything (except a chance to gain a partizan advantage) the Government did not decide upon extending the time in the section west of Carleton Head and not extending it in the section east of that point until the very last moment—leading the packers all the while to suppose that the prayer of their respectful petitions would be granted. This has been one of the stormiest seasons in the history of the lobster industry, and it is not much wonder that the lobster packers, who have in the circumstances been so inconsiderately and unjustly discriminated against, are indignant.

### NOTES AND COMMENTS

—We have been reminded that it was Sir Louis Davies who barked Mr. Richardson's bill which provided that the number of the Civil Service might be compelled to pay his honest debts.

—A London journal states that the Army Temperance Association has 15,000 members in the army in the British Islands, and 20,000 in the Army in India. Thus, it says, about one man in every six is a total abstainer.

—The dismissal of Attorney General Martin of British Columbia, is generally approved. Even the best friends and staunchest advocates of this "Leading Liberal" admit "there is only one man to blame for it, and that man is Mr. Martin himself."

—The Montreal Witness, one of the strongest Liberal papers in Canada admits that "the West Elgin case was one of the worst that ever came before a court." Honest and independent Liberals everywhere must blush for shame that the party which they placed in power to elevate the standard of public morality and to economize the public resources has fallen so far short of their ideal.

—The London Central News says that Dr. Lambert Lack, a London surgeon, after long investigation, has established the theory that cancer is not attributable to a germ, but is always due to a specific injury to the basement membrane of the mucous membrane and allied structures. Dr. Lack produced cancer in animals by inflicting such injury. A select committee of the Pathological Society which examined the results of Dr. Lack's investigations declared that they are practically conclusive.

—The Transvaal Boer will eat almost anything in the flesh, fish or fowl line, for all is grist that comes to his gizzard, and the following mixtures are voted most delectable by the majority of the rougher classes. A great square slice is cut off a loaf made of coarse unsifted meal, and covered with a thick layer of jam—preferably strawberry, a row of sardines is then placed on top, and the oil from the sardine box is liberally poured over the whole. A loud smacking of lips and other manifestations of thorough appreciation accompany the disposal of this delicate bonne-bouche; but the unsophisticated Boer only indulges in this luxury when he means to enjoy a special treat, quite regardless of expense.

Mail and Empire: The reaction against corruption and chicanery is making rapid headway. With young Canadians of the type of Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, Hugh John Macdonald and James Finlay Whitney coming to the head of affairs in the three great provinces of British Columbia, Manitoba, and Ontario, the wave of political vice must be rolled back.

Montreal Star: It is amusing to find the Liberal press bursting forth into a crackling jubilation over the mere denial by some outside party of some one or other of the Tupper charges which, taken as a whole, it vehemently declares to be too trivial to call for a judicial investigation. To unimportant to investigate, but a tremendous relief when denied, is a mental attitude that lets in a good deal of light on the inner feelings of the Liberal mind.
