The executive meeting in connection with the 112th annual meeting of the Diocesan Church Society was held in St. Peter's Cathedral Parish Hall Wednesday afternoon, with the Venerable G. R. Harrison, M.A., B.D. in the Chair, together with the Clergy of the Deanery and a good number of lay delegates.

A resolution of sympathy was ordered to be sent to the Treasurer of the Society, Mr. R. F. Acorn who is ill in hospital.

The various financial statements were examined, and expenditures for 1956 authorized.

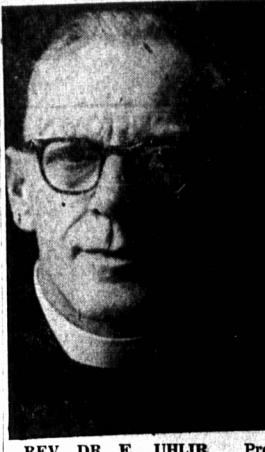
The Missionary Department report was presented by the Rev. Canon Ibbott, after which it was announced that the Deanery as a whole had more than met its apportionment for 1955.

The report of the Social Service Department was presented by the Rev. Eric Ingraham of Kensington, which showed the Department had been active during the past year.

The Rev. Canon Moffatt presented the report of the Religious Education Department, which showed a year of increase in activity.

The report of the Church Center (at Crapaud) Department, was presented by the Rev. G. R. F. Ebsary, which spoke of the success of the camps held there during last summer. Some alterations are needed as well as more equipment, both of which were authorized.

All these reports brought about considerable interest and discussion after which were accepted with thanks.

ESSAYS
