THE market on Tuesday was small and active. Prices had an upward tendency as follows: Beef (small) per lb. 5 to 12 cents; do, (quarter) 4 to 7 cents; Mutton per lb 4 to 8 cents; Lamb per lb 4 to 8 cents; Veal per lb 5 to 7 cents; Ducks each, 20 to 30 cents; Hens each 15 to 20 cents; Chickens per pair 30 to 50 cents; Butter (fresh) 20 to 23 cents; do (tub) 18 to 20 cents; Eggs 20 to 23 cents; Hay per cwt 40 to 50 cents; Potatoes per bush 45 to 48 cents; Flour per cwt \$3.25 to \$3.50; Oatmeal per cwt \$3.00 to \$3.25; Oat per bush, 36 to 40 cents; Geese each, 45 to 60 cents; Sheepskins, 60 to 80 cents; Pork per carcass, 6 to 7 1/2 cents; do, small 8 to 11 cents; Turkeys each 80 to 90 cents.

PRESENTATION.—To-day Michael Foley, Esq., of this city, presented Mr. William Finlayson with a silver watch, for good conduct and able management of the brig, Parnell, after the death of Capt. Gavin, which occurred at Barbadoes in June last, from yellow fever. Mr. Finlayson was mate of the vessel at the time, and on the death of the captain he took command and brought her safely to Halifax. The watch is a very handsome one, and bears the following inscription:

Presented by M. FOLEY,

WILLIAM FINLAYSON, for his good management of Brigantine Parnell, after death of CAPTAIN MICHAEL GAVIN, at Barbadoes, June 15th, 1881.

POTATOES are coming into the city very slowly to-day, and prices range from 45 to 50 cents. Advice of the 22nd inst., from Boston to the St. John papers state that "the demand for potatoes continues only moderate there but the cargo prices remain pretty firm. Something nice in Boniton rose stock will bring \$1 per bushel by the carload, but 90c and 95c will cover the general run of eastern stock, both rose and prolific. The quality now coming forward is complained of as small in size, as compared with former years. A despatch of the 23rd, from Yarmouth, N. S., to the Halifax Herald reports that "The steamer 'Dominion' sailed for Boston at midnight with a large cargo, principally of potatoes. She was compelled to leave 800 barrels behind, being unable to carry them. Yarmouth was flooded yesterday with teams from various parts of the country loaded with potatoes. As much as seventy cents per bushel was paid in cash. This is the highest price ever known here. The crop was not a good one and the large quantity exported will create a potato famine this winter. Many farmers sold for sixty to seventy cents per bushel cash, in the hope of buying P. E. Island potatoes later in the fall for thirty or forty cents. But this is where they have made a mistake. The Island will not send a potato to local markets. It is believed that one dollar per bushel will be the price here all winter."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

IRISH NEWS.

DUBLIN, Oct. 23.

At the last meeting of the Central League, on Tuesday, Rev. Michael Keane, D. D., a Dublin priest, was proposed for membership and denoting applause, he being a clergyman in the Diocese of Archbishop McCabe, over whom the incident was considered a victory. Early next morning Father Keane was summoned to the Archbishop's residence and peremptorily given the choice between publicly withdrawing and apologizing for his indiscretion and disobedience or submitting to suspension. He declined to apologize publicly and was suspended on the spot ex informata conscientia by the Archbishop under powers conferred by the Council of Trent, the disgraced priest being not even allowed to say Mass.

LONDON, Oct. 23.

The meeting in Trafalgar Square, last evening, to express indignation at Parnell's arrest, was a failure owing to the rain; there were only about 1,000 persons present, and, after considerable hustling, resolutions condemning the Government's action were formally declared carried.

The indignation meeting in Hyde Park to-day was attended by over 50,000 persons. The speeches were of the usual violent character—and were delivered from six platforms. The principal speakers were Messrs. Barry, O'Donnell and Finnegan, Home Rule members of Parliament, and Messrs. Clarke and Hyndeman and Miss Craigan connected with the London Democratic Association.

Resolutions denouncing the cowardly and lawless action of the coercion government in attempting forcibly to suppress freedom of speech, were unanimously carried. The names "Judas Gladstone" and "Quaker Bright," especially the latter, was greeted with groans and shouts of "traitors."

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

CAIRO, Oct. 23.

Consul General Wolf was yesterday formally received by the Khedive. The whole of the Cairo garrison was under arms, and American national airs were played. The American flag was hoisted and a royal salute fired. The Khedive made a touching address, referring to the death of General Garfield. The serenity was of the highest interest. Mr. Simon Wolf being the first diplomatic envoy in Egypt of the Jewish religion since the days of the Pharos, special services were held in the Synagogues.

TUNIS, Oct. 23.

Ben Amar, chief of the insurgents, is urging the Tunisians in the name of their religion, to resist the practical cession of the country to France. The insurgents are reported to be massed near the Oude Zergha station. All Bris troops were induced to march to Zaghouna only by the officers threatening to shoot any mutineers.

With reference to the rumor that the Marquis of Lorne was suffering from a severe attack of congestion of the lungs, Col. De-Winton says:—"It is impossible to say where the rumor originated, but probably from the fact that His Excellency has been suffering for the last two days from a heavy cold. They who picture Queen Victoria in their mind's eye as clad in a robe of crimson with a gold crown upon her head, will be shocked to learn that she takes her daily drive with a black straw bonnet upon her head, and with a large shawl of small check shepherd's plaid upon her shoulders. It is related that Sir Thomas Wade, the British Minister at Peking, who had been a resident of China for forty years, and was familiar with the language and customs of the people, hearing of the death of an old Chinese friend, started off for his funeral, when he for the first time learned that no foreigner, no matter what his capacity, was permitted to attend the funeral of a Chinaman.

A CHILD WONDER.—Mr. Foster, of Annapolis County, N. S., called at the office of the St. John Telegraph, on Saturday morning, in company with his son, about five years old, who, he says, weighs only five pounds. The child seemed in excellent health and spirits and was quite talkative while his father walked him upon the counter. He is scarcely two feet in height.
