## EXCITING SCENE IN THE HOUSE

### Mr. Blair Loses His Temper

AND IS DRESSED DOWN BY THE  
OPPOSITION.

Refused, as Usual, to Give Them Information.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, Aug. 5.—When the Railway subsidies were up yesterday, Mr. Blair lost his temper when asked for information regarding the Rainy River subsidy.

Some of the members are of the opinion that this line will either be a connection by which the Northern Pacific Railway of the United States will capture the traffic of the Northwest and carry it to the United States ports or else that it will pass into the control of the Canadian Pacific.

For this reason the Western members sought to insert a clause limiting freight rates for wheat on this road.

Clarke Wallace asked Mr. Blair what distance the road would be from the United States border.

I am sure I don't know, said Blair, in his most cavalier manner.

Foster: "We may as well quit altogether. It is simply shameful that members should be treated in this way."

Blair: "I won't submit to such talk. What right have you to lecture me? I know my duties. I want the House to understand that I won't be lectured by the Opposition."

Taylor: "You'll have to."

Blair: "I will not. I can go into the corridor and treat those questions with the contempt they deserve."

Foster: "You've made a good many exhibitions of yourself in this House, but this is about the worst yet."

Wallace: "The Minister of Railways will find that he cannot carry out the bluff game here. It is humiliating to see his utter want of information. The Minister brings no documents before the House, and when he does read one of a number asked for, he hides it away, saying that is a private paper of his own."

"Wallace contrasted Blair's conduct with that of Sir Charles Tupper, who, when he asked for railway subsidies, came to the House with full details in respect to all classes." "The Minister threatened to go into the corridor; he might as well go there and stay for all the good he is here."

After further exchange of remarks some little information was given and the item passed.

## THE WEST INDIAN ISLANDS.

Mr. Chamberlain Makes a Significant Statement in Parliament.

LONDON, August 4.—During the debate in the House of Commons on Wednesday on the Colonial Loans Bill, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, Mr. Chamberlain said in regard to the Government of the West Indies that the constitutional rights should not be further extended, adding that in some cases they had already gone too far and the electors did not care for their privileges, claiming that the "so-called liberal constitutions were nothing more or less than oligarchies." Continuing Mr. Chamberlain said he was convinced the Crown and Government would be guided by local public opinion as to the best system.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Aug. 3.—Popular resentment against the conditions of the Imperial loan is rapidly increasing and finding significant expression through the newspapers. The Telegraph commenting on the subject says it recognizes the presence of another political crisis involving a grim struggle, and with a greater need of enlightened combinations than at any period since 1866. Continuing the Telegraph says: "While the Island must not repudiate its liabilities, it can raise a loan on its own responsibilities without selling its political manhood. It must offer resistance to all principalities and powers, that can be brought into operation by an inimical and despotic Imperial policy, having the sympathy of all generous impulses of this progressive and democratic age."

## Railway Subsidies.

OTTAWA, August 4.—The railway subsidy resolutions were the subject of debate in the House at this morning's sitting. The Minister of Railways endeavoured to justify the enormous expenditure of \$6,500,000 proposed by the Government by saying that Sir Charles Tupper had committed himself and the Opposition to that proposal. But Mr. Foster denied that Sir Charles had taken any such stand. The Opposition was not committed to any such enormous expenditure and, while in favor of granting assistance to railways urgently required in the development of the country, took the position that when possible railways should be constructed by private enterprise and capital.

## Business at Atlin.

VANCOUVER, B. C., August 4.—Captain John Irving, of the Canadian Pacific Navigation Company has returned from Atlin with a nugget worth \$300. He says Atlin is as busy as a beehive and sixty claims have from three to twenty-five men working upon them. He estimates that the clean-up for the season will be fully \$2,000,000. A remarkable feature about the Atlin gold is the fact that it is the richest in British Columbia if not in America, running as it is panned from \$17.50 to \$18 an ounce. The Discovery claim, after having been worked over a year, has been sold to R. Brownlee, brother of the Provincial Government Surveyor, for \$25,000 cash.

## Lord Pauncefote.

LONDON, Aug. 4.—The British Ambassador to the United States assumes the title of Lord Pauncefote as a result of his elevation to the peerage. He is still considering what territorial style he will take. The Ambassador will return to The Hague shortly to complete some business. Conference details there, and will start for Washington in October. He will finally retire from the diplomatic service in March or April next. Lord Pauncefote expects to resume the Alaska negotiations, which have been "suspended during the hot weather," on his arrival in Washington.

## To Make Twenty-three Knots.

BERLIN, Aug. 4.—The North German Lloyd's Steamship Company has placed an order with the Vulcan Ship Building Company, near Stettin, for a line to be completed by the summer of 1901, which shall make twenty-three knots an hour. This is two knots faster than was called for in the contract for the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse.

## Good Harvest in Southern England

LONDON, Aug. 4.—The South of England harvesting of wheat, oats, and hay is heavy. The weather is splendid, and the acreage above the usual. Fruit was never better; cherries are exceptionally fine, and apples and black and red currants are splendid.

ONLY WANT \$3,000,000

Claims of Depressed Miners in the Atlin District.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 4.—Ex-Congressman James Hamilton Lewis left for Washington today to present to the State Department the claims of the American miners against the Canadian Government for damages sustained through the enactment of a law by the Provincial Legislature of British Columbia debaring aliens from locating placer-claims in the Atlin mining district. It is expected that the proposed claims will be made a subject of arbitration before the Joint High Commission. Mr. Lewis represented about one thousand miners whose claims aggregate \$3,000,000.

## Gold for Canada.

NEW YORK, August 4.—Shipments of gold to Canada have been made by the Canadian branch banks in this city for the last few days. The movement is spoken of as a precautionary one, the purpose being to allay alarm in Montreal. It was stated today that the bank of Montreal had shipped about \$600,000 and the Bank of British North America about \$250,000. The Canadian Bank of Commerce is understood to have shipped a large amount. The gold reserve will not be materially affected by these shipments, Boston and other a-ar-by points having sent a large amount of gold to this city, with more to come to-morrow.

Le Quotidien: "The sum the Government is asking from Parliament is more than \$60,000,000—a million dollars a week."

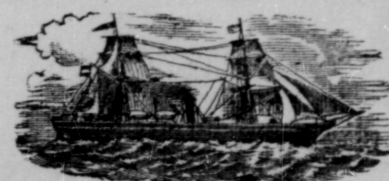

WASHINGTON, August 4.—R. W. Fitzpatrick, of the Treasury Department, has just returned from Ottawa, where he went at the instance of the Committee of Citizens of Chicago in charge of the ceremonies of laying the corner stone of that city's great post office building next October by President McKinley, to arrange for the formal invitation and expected acceptance of Government members, and the Governor-General, who will participate.
